Lincoln & State of Kentucky. Being in
a low State of Health but of sound
Mind and recollection Do make and
Declare this my last Will and Testa-
ment in the manner and form as fol-
lows (To wit) I Commit unto my Hea-
venly Father my Soul - After all just
Debts are paid, I give unto my beloved
Wife Patsy two Negroes (viz) One
Negro Fellow named Brice and Juan
his Wife. Three Children now living
and the Increase to be equally Divided
amongst my Children as they arrive
at Lawful Age. Including the Child
my Wife is now Pregnant with the
above two Negroes Brice & Juan to be
her property during Life Also One
Negro Woman (given me by my Father
in Law Samuel Woolfolk) named
Agnes

Agnes together with all her increase
 from this Date. One Gold Watch, One
 Cupboard & furniture, One Bedstead,
 and One Bed with the Furniture also
 her Choice of Horses to herself, and
 theirs forever To my Children inclu-
 ding the one my Wife is now Pregnant
 with, I give and Bequeath the follow-
 ing Slaves (viz) Glaston, Betty, his Wife
 Hampton, Manning, Peter, and all their
 Increase also Elijah, Jerry, and the
 present Children of the before men-
 tioned Agnes and all and Every of my
 Stock whatever to be sold at twelve
 Months Exact together with the
 now sold furniture and Divided toge-
 ther with all Demands and my Estate
 by Bonds, Notes, &c. to be equally divided
 amongst them & The Plantation on
 which I reside in I give unto my Wife

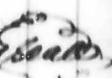
During her Widowhood, or as long
 as she shall think Proper to live. Having
 without ignoring the Demands also
 my Father One Good Chair — To my
 Son Stephen I give in account
 of his inheritance the Extra sum of
 one Hundred Pounds out of the Mo-
 nies coming to the whole of my
 Children — I nominate and appoint
 my Wife Betty together with Circ-
 cise & John Warren to be the
 Executors of this my Last will and
 Testament. I Witness whereof I have
 hereunto Subscribed my name and af-
 fixed my seal this 2nd Day of Decem-
 ber 1786

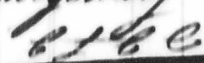
