I William Giles of Lincoln
County and State of Kentucky tho
but weak in body yet of a Sound
and perfect Memory and knowing
the Fragility of man, and that it oft-
times for man to Die, to Constitute
this my last Will and Testament, and
do desire it to be Received as such by

all persons, And as to such Worldly
Estate as it hath been pleased God
to bestow on me I do hereby Dispose of
in the Following manner. I Give
and Bequeath unto my Well Beloved wife
Lucy One Negro Woman Name Mary
and an Negro Boy Name Dave, also
all Sara Pennys increase unto my
Wife to her and her heirs
forever. I Give and Bequeath
unto my Well Beloved Wife as afore-
said One Bay Mare and her increase
to her and her heirs forever.

I Give and Bequeath unto my Well
beloved Wife Lucy One Feather Bed
to her and her heirs forever as also all
my Household Furniture to her and
heirs forever.

I Give and Bequeath unto my
Brother Ephraim Giles One Bay horse

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I have given to him his share forever
I have I do constitute this my last
will and Testament this and no other
in testimony whereof. I have hereunto
set my hand and seal this 5th Day
of July in the year of our Lord 1803

Day of August 1803 This Last will &
Testament of William Giles was Ex-
hibited into Court and Proven by
the Oath of Isaac Blain subscribing
Witnesses thereto and known to record

In the State of Georgia I Shicajah
Proctor of Lincoln County and Com-
monwealth of Kentucky—Being sick
and weak in Body But of Perfect
Mind and memory—Therefore taking
into consideration the Mortality of my
Body knowing that it is appointed for
all men once to die make and contain
this my Last will and Testament

I am persuaded It is my will and I do
order that in the first place all
my Just Debts and funeral Charges
be paid and Satisfied Then I give and
bequeath unto my Dearest Beloved wife
Elizabeth Proctor the use of my place
situation where I now reside with all
the Farming Utensils and household
Furniture Except what I may hereafter
bequeath to her during her natural
life after her Decease I allow my
Plantation to be Equally Divided.
