In the name of God Amen I David Stoyd of Leicester County being of lawful health and of sound mind and memory blessed be God for the same, calling to mind the mortality of my Body do constitute and ordain this my last Will and Testament hereby revoking all other Wills by me heretofore made and declaring, to be my last Will and Testament in form and manner following. (To wit, I bequeath to my beloved wife Sarah Stoyd during her natural life or Widowhood one half of the tract of Land whereon I now live to be divided by a line to run due East & West so as to include the Houses I live in and as much of the plantation as falls in the said line; her part to be on the North side of the said line and bounded by the lines of Nathaniel Lawrence, John Watkinson, Berford, and others. Also I give my said wife one third part of the crop of corn, Wheat & Tobacco that may be on the place at the time of my decease. Item I give and bequeath to my son Bayard Stoyd, George Stoyd, John Stoyd and David Stoyd, and my two daughters Mary Stoyd and Grace Stoyd, and to my grand daughter Mary Whiggleton, daughter of my daughter Betty Whiggleton dec^d all the Lands that I am proprietor of to be equally divided amongst

them the said, Benjamin Floy, George Floy, John Floy,
 David Floy, Mary Floy, Grace Floy and my grand
 daughter Mary Singleton at the time of my death. (all the
 said except the one half of the Tract whereon I now live
 which I have lent to my beloved wife during her natural
 life or widowhood, and after her death or marriage to be di-
 vided in equal proportions betwixt all my said children before
 named and my grand daughter Mary Singleton. Also I give
 unto my said children Benjamin Floy, George Floy, John
 Floy and David Floy, Mary Floy and Grace Floy, and
 my grand daughter Mary Singleton all my stock of Horses,
 cattle, sheep and hogs and all my Plantation Utensils of every
 kind and household & kitchen furniture, and the remainder
 of the crop of corn, Wheat & Potatoes that I did not give to my wife,
 in this my said last Will and Testament to be equally divided
 amongst them my said children and my grand daughter
 Mary Singleton, to them and their heirs forever.
 Also I give and bequeath to my sons Benjamin Floy, George
 Floy, John Floy & David Floy, & to my five daughters Mary
 Floy and Grace Floy the following Negroes, Viz James
 David, Betty, Tom, John, Frank, Sue, Salt, Ann, Esther, (Laney,
 Gray, Young Frank, Young Salt, Isbel, & Dick. None of these
 future increase to be equally divided amongst them & their heirs
 forever. Also I further give and bequeath to my son
 David Floy (over and above what I have before given him)
 one negro boy named Jacob, to him and his heirs forever.
 Also I further give and bequeath to my grand daughter
 Mary Singleton, daughter of my daughter Betty Singleton, &
 two negro girls named Nell & Bett to her and their future
 increase to her and her heirs forever. And if my son
 David

David Floy or my grand daughter Mary Singleton should
 die without an heir, my will and desire is that the Negroes left
 them should be equally divided amongst my children that are
 then living, to them and their heirs forever. And Lastly
 I do constitute and appoint my three sons Benjamin Floy,
 George Floy and John Floy Executors of this my last will and
 Testament (hereby revoking all other Wills by me heretofore made
 in Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed
 my seal the twelfth day of September Anno Domini one thousand
 seven hundred and eighty seven
 a signed, sealed & acknowledged
 in the presence of us
 David Floy Esq.

At a Court held for Seneca County the 16th day of
 December 1788 This Will was proved by the Oaths of Robert
 Singleton and Nathan Lammere Witnesses thereto and ordered
 to be Recorded. And on the Motion of Benjamin Floy,
 George Floy & John Floy the Executors therein named, who
 made oath and executed and acknowledged before us the said
 Clerks a probate is granted them for obtaining a probate there
