In the Name of God amen I William W. W. of
Lincoln County Commonwealth of Virginia being in per-
fect health and of sound mind and memory but calling to
mind the mortality of my and that it is appointed for all
men once to die, and first I recommend my body to the earth
to be buried in a Christian manner at the discretion of my
Executors hereafter to be appointed and my soul I commend into
the hands of almighty God who gave it me and as to what worldly
Goods God has been pleased to bless me with in this life I give
and devise in manner following to wit, and first I require
that all my just debts be paid or discharged then I give and
bequeath unto Martha W. W. my well beloved Wife one Negro
Man to me from Hubert Taylor and one good Mare to be
£20 Value old rate a good side Saddle a pair of new harness
and all the clothes furniture as also an equal third of my Cattle
and further she is to have all the utensils for husbandry and
privileges of occupying the plantation I now live on freely
to enjoy during her life and as also a Negro man due to me
from said Taylor then give and bequeath unto my love

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beloved Sons William & Sapsley McBride all & singular
my Lands not otherwise Directed to be equally divided between them
as also all the horses and Cattle not a Bond Requisite to the
utensils for husbandry together with the Negroe man and the plan-
tation at the said Martha McBride's death or Marriage whomever
may happen first as also the above said income of her increase of
any to be equally divided between said William Sapsley McBride
at their Mother's death and provided either of said Sons should die
before they come of age the survivor to be heir to the said I fur-
ther require that my Executors do sell 300 Acres of Land (for the best
advantage) (viz) the due me from John McEntire as will more
plainly appear by a Bond on said McEntire for said Land the mo-
ney arising from said sale to be Applied in purchasing Cattle
and other necessarys for my Daughters household named Flora Sybil
and Rebecca unto each of my beloved Daughters Lavinia, Martha, De-
sebeth, and Mary, a good feather Bed & Quilted cover, a silk gown and
other like thing suitable so as to make up one decent Casket to each
four Cows and a good Horse and Saddle each with a pair of shoes for
winter proportionable to each also a new Bible and Confession of
Faith to each these Legacies to be paid to each of my Daughters when
they come to twenty years of age or at their Marriage & as they be-
arrived at eighteen years to be paid by my Sons William & Sapsley
McBride or by my Executors out of out of said Estate and I do hereby
Constitute and appoint my well beloved Wife Martha McBride,
John Sapsley and James Davis Executors of this my last Will & Testa-
ment and to see to it that my Children may be properly educated
and brought in a Christian manner hereby Revoking and an-
nulling all former Wills & Testaments & Bequests heretofore made
Ratifying and declaring this to be my last Will and Testament
Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seal this 3rd day
