Bed & Furniture, & one cow and calf my Daughters
Peggy, Polly, Lucy & Nancy Ward, each of them to
have one bed and Furniture when they marry or
leave their mother. I wish the property to be carefully kept
and not wasted or made away with if my wife can
make payment for the balance I owe for the land
she may keep the two horses & two steers, if not they
must be sold to pay that debt. Lastly I appoint
John M. Howell & Jeremiah Ward my whole and sole
executors of this my last will & Testament. In
