I William Reading of Russellville Logan County and State of Kentucky apprehending my approaching dissolution and wishing to settle my affairs after this life do make this my last will and testament

In the first place it is my desire that if I should depart this life in the State of Kentucky that my remains may be brought and buried along side of my departed house and my three children adjoining the Town of Russellville, and that the spot where we are laid may be post and raised and that my executors hereafter mentioned receive and have set up head stones with the proper inscriptions to be put thereon of the names dates &c. The cost attending the above services to be paid out of the first money that shall come into their hands

I next desire that all my just debts be paid as speedily as possible, they are not of large amount, all that I owe in Philadelphia are to Smith, Parker & Co. \$321. 27. Leonard's Store \$72. 62. Jeremiah Morris \$156. 34 James Davis & Co. \$126. 66 Thos. J. M. Bradfute \$17,000 and a few dollars to Mr. Packer not more than 10 or 20 and about the same amount to Anthony Becken, Pittsburgh and to Mr. Smith of Pittsburgh for a box of Iron. There are all the debts I owe to my Merchants Corresponding. There is a bond in the hands of John Lane formerly of Pittsburgh which has been paid as will appear by his letter to me with a receipt on it also John Hartung bond on me for cotton has been paid as will appear by letters and receipts to me, there is also in the hands of Messrs. Neel & Hough Merchants of Philadelphia several drafts drawn on them by me for Merchandise purchased in the City which was paid by them and since settled by me but not taken up.

It is further my desire that the suits now depending by me against John Hendley be dismissed. Not that the demand is not just but that his villainy will, never will suffer a recovery of the money. It is further my desire that the judgment Hendley has against me may be paid off. Also that the judgment Brown has against me may be settled as well as the judgment Dickman has obtained on the Green Circuit Court. Altho I can not think Justice has been done me.

It is further my desire that the workman now employed upon my new brick ~~Building~~ Building complete the same and that Mr. Phipps be so agreeable to memorandum among my papers signed by myself and him, I have settled with Lewis Patton for his work but he has not done his part quite agreeable to contract he holds my note for something less than \$200. It is further my desire that all my personal property including the negroes be sold upon a credit of eighteen months and the proceeds as collected be vested in Kentucky Bank Stock, also all my lands in the state of Kentucky except the such as are hereafter disposed of in this Will be sold in such manner as my executors shall think most advantageous either at public or private sale and the proceeds to be vested in bank stock aforesaid.

It is further my desire that all my just debts be paid out of my outstanding debts as soon as they can be collected. I conceived a consignment of cotton to Mr. Anthony Becken of Pittsburgh will settle all my Philadelphia and Pittsburgh debts I have sent him about 6,000 Pounds and have directed him to remit the proceeds to Steel and Hurley of Philad. I owe these Gentlemen nothing but my best wishes for their prosperity to me.

It is further my desire that the house and Lot I possess in the town of Repidition be divided between my two Daughters Betty and Rebecca in the following manner to wit beginning at the corner of main cross street and running Northwardly with main cross street to the division wall in my new house North of the alley which runs through the center of the house thence from the beginning corner with main cross street to Caldwell's lot he now lives on thence in the his line and westerly so far as by drawing a line westerwardly and parallel with main cross street 101.10 strikes the center of the

Alley in my new brick house - This I give to my daughter
Betsey the Balance of my house and Lott with the
privilege of using the alley as a common passage
or way I give to my daughter Rebecca, I further give
to my daughter Betsey in a tract of Land containing
Stands on also 200. Acers of Land taken up under
a certificate in the name of John McCarty in Living-
ston County also ^{five} Hundred acers lying on the west
boundary of Reuben Ewings Grove commonly called
Puntlings and two small tracts adjoining it both surveyed
in the name of John Reading.

To my daughter Rebecca I give 200 hundred acers of Land
lying in Livingston County deeded to me by Moses Shelby

hand in hemp yards the sale of grounds is at my desire that my

Subject to the contract made with John N. Smith and only
a premise for a part of the Lott by Charles W. Wing Esq. who
was attorney in fact for Mrs Campbell in her life time, the
whole of my property herein directed to be sold when the
payers come into their possession it is my desire may be sold

in Bank stock and be divided equally between my two daughters
also what bank stock I now have at my desire may be divided
between them equally and finally I do appoint John Brantlett
Esq. Edward Guin and Samuel Wilson my executors with a request
that they will see this my last will carried into effect. In
