 70 poles from a post oak marked S.D. the beginning corner
 of Dabbs survey running thence S. 77° E. 135 poles to a black oak
 and Spanish oak on the north west line thence with that
 line S. 77° E. 135 poles to a Spanish oak and dogwood thence
 S. 77° E. 135 poles to a stake on the south east line thence
 with said line to the beginning, containing by survey 61
 acres, & the portion now as is, and proceed to allot and divide
 the negroes belonging to the said estate as to the said and divided
 said negroes and give to the said W. Dabbs her share of said
 negroes and it appearing to us that the negro named Hannah
 had been sold by the said W. Dabbs to that she could not be had,
