and memory and wish to dispose of my property as
follows first I wish that all my Just Debts be discharg-
ed by my Executors hereafter named
I will and bequeath to my beloved wife, Nancy Hart all
my property both in debt and excepting one third here
I will that my said sword have to be sold and Divided
equally between my three sons at the age of twenty one John
Hart Henry Hart & John Hart & likewise I wish the three
boys to be put to trade & I further desire that with my
Executors to do as they best. I give unto my Daughter Anne
Hart twenty Shillings At the age of eighteen whereas I have
Peter Todd & Daniel McQuinn my Executors to my will & I
declare this and this alone to be my last will and Testament
to have I separately sign my name to my seal this 10th day
of December 1804

The Testimonial Will of James Collier committed to
writing the 12th December 1804 by John Collier Senior & Junior
first John Collier Jun says that on the 15th day of November
1804 James Collier Deceased told him that if he died
he wanted his present crop of corn to be for the support
of his family and if there was any surplus to be a place
to the purpose of schooling his children and that all his
Bonded Debts and one hundred Dollars he had deposited
in the hands of Joseph Ellison to be kept at Interest and
given to his children when they became of age he had of
land he lived on if it was not lost at law to be equally
divided amongst his three sons also that his wife should
sell a horse and apply the price in building a house as
soon as he thinks it safe in account of the title of land
to do so & that all open accounts and the like of every
kind should be for the support of his wife and children
as long as she remains a Widow except one filly that he
wished should be traded for a gentle beast to work
John Collier Senior saw him the Deceased on the 16th of the
same month and Received the same in witnesses with a
request that he John Collier Senior & Joseph Ellison should admin-
-ister & he further directed him to have a certain Horse sold
that his Debts should be paid out of his price & the balance
applied as his administrators might think best for the
use of his family.
