But if she should marry again that at her death my Will and desire is that all my Estate personal be equally divided amongst my three youngest Children to wit Dudley and Ephraim Farthing. Secondly I give to my son Samuel Farthing when he arrives at the age of twenty one years or a Sum of the Value of Forty Dollars & that at the death of my wife after said my Will is that the said sum be equally divided between my said sons Edward and Ephraim.
