

In the name of God amen.

I Asaph Walker of Middlesex

County and State of Kentucky, being weak in body but in perfect mind and memory, thanks be given to almighty God, knowing that it is appointed for all men, once to die, do therefore give and ordain this my last Will & Testament:

That is to say, first of all I give and recommend my soul to God that giveth, and may today I recommend to a doubtful burial at the direction of my Executors, hoping that I shall receive the same at the resurrection, by the almighty power and as to such worldly Estate, whereunto I hath pleased God to bless me with in this life I give devise and dispose of in the following manner and form - In the first place, it is my Will and desire, that all my debts shall be paid and satisfied.

Now I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Adeloth Walker during her natural life or widowhood three hundred acres of land including the plantation I now live on with all my house hold and kitchen furniture, and all my plantation utensils, and nine negroes, to wit, LITTLE, MOLLIE, CHARLES, PETER, JOE, JANE, CUDDEY, BILLIE, and POLARA with all the increase of the same with all my horses, cattle, sheep and hogs.

Now it is my will and desire, that my wife shall give unto my three children, to wit, Elizabeth Walker, DORIS Walker, and POLLY Walker, at her decease, or as they come of age, at her discretion to each of them one feather bed, and furniture, one cow, and calf one year old, hogs and two sheep -

in Dower to my wife shall take place. And lastly I constitute and appoint my beloved sons, Stephen Walker, James Walker, William Walker, and my two sons in law, Leffly Pullen, and Thomas Wade Executors of this my last Will and Testament in the construction of which I have endeavored to be plain and explicit in all the devises, and hope and trust that disputes will arise concerning them, but if contrary to my expectation the case shall be otherwise, my Will and direction is, that all disputes (if unhappily any should arise) shall be decided by three impartial and intelligent men to be chosen by the disputants, each having the choice of one, and the third by those two, which three being first chosen, shall declare the sense of the Testator's intentions, and such decision to all intents and purposes to be as binding as the Testator's if it had been given in the Supreme Court of the United States. In Witness of all and each of these things herein contained, I set my hand and seal this 24th day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and seven.
