Item I give unto my daughters Betsey Crooke Polly Crooke and Sally Crooke one feather bed and furniture to each of them equal to those of their former sisters who is married and gone from me, together with each of them a good cow and calf, the above mentioned property to be delivered to them at the day of their or either of their Marriages, or at the ages of twelvemonth if they so long remain single, and all the rest of my property is to be my wife during her life time and at her death to be equally divided among my children. Item as for my daughter Anna Strong Chase better & Sally Pollard, I consider I have given them their equal share of my estate so far, until my wife's death and after her death the property to be equally divided among all my children, Anna Strong and Isaac better and Sally Pollard and Zachariah Crooke and Hezekiah Crooke and Wm Crooke and Polly Crooke and Sally Crooke and John Crooke and lastly I constitute and appoint my wife Maryann Crooke and Zachariah Crooke and Hezekiah Crooke, my two sons to be the whole and Executors of this my last Will and Testament left at their own discretion without giving security or having appraisement or sale.
