In the name of God amen I Peter Taylor of Madison County and State of Kentucky in but indifferent State of health but in sound mind and memory but calling to mind the mortality of man and that altho' death and certain constitute and declare this to be my last will and testament first and chiefly I give my soul to god who gave me with a lively hope of his pardoning mercy through the merits of my blessed saviour Jesus Christ My body to be buried until the great day of the Resurrection and as touching my worldly goods wherewith it hath pleased Almighty God to bless me with I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Nancy Taylor my plantation where I now live during her widow hood to raise my children my Amy and her daughter Lucy and my negro David my wife takes as much of her part of my Estate during her life I give and bequeath to my son David Taylor the one half of my land lying on the Viney fork of Muddy Creek and the lower end I give and bequeath to son Peter Taylor of said Tracts of land lying on viney fork of Muddy Creek in co partenance also give to my son David Taylor my negro slave Isaac and Rachel I give and bequeath to my son Peter Taylor my negro Harry and boy Sepu James saw I give and bequeath to my son William Taylor my land on Horse fork of Silver Creek it being the land patented for William Hays I give and bequeath to my son William Taylor my negro slave Brister and my negro slave James son of David and Amy I give and bequeath to my son Samuel Taylor my land lying on the water of horse fork of Silver
