At a Court held for Middlesex County on Monday the 5th day of February 1810 The Inventory and appraisement of the estate of Charles Rice Dec^d was returned and ordered to be recorded.

In obedience to an Order of the Court of Middlesex County at their December Term 1809 directing us to settle the estate of Soga Portwood Dec^d being sworn we find from the will of the Deceased that all his personal estate is given to his widow during her widowhood to which will we refer there was a writing produced and acknowledged by the parties to be a settlement made between the widow and Captain Thomas Crews by it it appears that Captain Thomas Crews was on the 5th of June 1804 indebted to the widow £41. 19. 5 out of which said Crews claims £19. 1. 0 paid by the Direction of the widow as more fully will appear by the receipt to herewith handed to you leaving a balance against said Crews

of £22. 18. 5 which he ought to pay with or without interest from the 5th of June 1804 as the Court may direct January 25 1810

At a Court held for Middlesex County the 2nd day of July 1810 This settlement with the will of Soga Portwood Dec^d was returned and ordered to be recorded. In the name of God amen I Samuel Jackson knowing the uncertainty of human life and being in weak and sickly state of health but in sound mind and memory do make this my last will and testament in manner and form following first of all I commend my soul to God who gave it and my body to be decently buried at the discretion of my Executors and good friends then I wish and Order my funeral expences and all my Just debts to be paid by my Executors out of my estate then as for my worldly goods that the Hoping of God hath bestowed on me both real and personal I wish it to be devised in manner & form following by my Executors, as for the personal estate I wish it to remain as it now stands with the increase for the benefit of my mother

and family I am I bequeath unto my Brother James Cochran my gun also my Sorel Man and her increase from this time I also give to my Brother Amos Cochran the young colt that the said Man has and as for what money I have owing to me in the different parts of the Country it is should be collected it is my desire that the humane dollar be applied to the use of repairing the plantations and a certain part of one thousand Dollars to be put out on interest and another part to the purchasing of three negro slaves two males and one female and after that if any money remains to be applied to the use of the family in what they stand in need of This I bequeath to my two brothers James Cochran & Amos Cochran also my three sisters Nancy Martha & Jane Cochran to be left as a portion by my executors according as they shall merit the same and I do hereby constitute & appoint Samuel Cochran Sen^r and Sam^r Cochran as Executors of this my last will and testament In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 9th day of October 1809

521 In the Name of God amen this twenty three of April one thousand eight hundred and ten I Martha Cook of the County of Madison and State of Kentucky being in low state of health but of sound and disposing mind and memory and considering man fully and having the uncertainty of life and the certainty of death do make and declare this to be my last will and testament first recommending my soul to God the author of it being and my body I recommend to the earth from whence it was taking hoping that at the general resurrection my soul & a body may reunite to the glory of God through the mediation of Jesus Christ and touching such worldly Estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me with in this life I give and demise and dispose of in the following manner, first it is my will & desire that all my just debt and funeral expenses be paid out of my personal estate by my executor hereafter to be named Then it is my desire that my executor or either of them do make title to the different purchasers for any lands by me sold agreeable to any articles entered into and obligations for title on the purchases complying with their agreements to the said title and also to procure title for all such lands to which I am entitled either by purchase or otherwise

Then I leave to my sister Isabella Mason one Negro man named Andrew and one Negro woman named Bym and her children Nancy Isaac Toby and her youngest child unnamed yet and all my horses and farming tools and house hold furniture and all the money due me from Samuel Lewis

Then I leave to each of my brothers and the rest my six Shillings to each one
