The manupolitive Will of Barnes Bridges who died the 1st day of December 1814. while on his way from North Carolina to his residence in Madison County Kentucky reduced to writing by Henry Star on the 9th day of December 1814 & given by to the direct and Testament of Henry Spence and Sally Boone who were present at the time of the death of the said Barnes Bridges

121 Nancy Spence & Sally Boone of lawful age state and say that they left the State of North Carolina on the 20th day of October 1814. Came in to Madison County Kentucky with a view of residing in it. The said Bridges the son in law of the said Nancy Spence in company with Lemuel Boone that after traveling several days they overtook the said Barnes Bridges and Sally his wife as they expulded who had left the State of North Carolina a short time before them, that they all came on together the said Bridges dead, being then much out of health having been in bad health for several months previous. They further state that they pursued ^{their} journey towards Kentucky till the evening of the 30th November 1814, when being in Knox County they put up at a small house which was unoccupied that during the night & while at this house Mr. Bridges became much worse that he expressed a wish to make his will and give all his property to his wife after paying his debts that this declaration was made in the hearing of the undersigned but that not having any ink & in the wilderness it ~~could~~ ^{could} not be done that he frequently expressed himself to the said Nancy Spence & Sally Boone that it was his wish to give all his property to his wife that he observed that they had no children nor should have any & that if he died not make his will his wife would have but his things which was not his wish but that she should have all that in the morning on the 1st Decr he called the said Nancy Spence to his bed and told her he would ~~bequeath~~ ^{bequeath} to all his property given to his wife and that he wanted much to make his will and ^{would} for some one to be sent for

122 that could do it. that a person was sent for accordingly and that as Mr. ~~John~~ ^{John} Davis came for that purpose and that while he entered the house that the said Nancy Spence observed Mr. Bridges that a persons had come to who could make his will that Mr. Bridges requested that a table might be ~~had~~ ^{procured} to do it that he told them not to trouble him and it was with great difficulty he could speak that they knew how he wanted his will made that the said Mr. Davis immediately set about writing his will and while doing it and after writing a few lines he the said Barnes Bridges expired before the will was finished.

The said Nancy Spence further states that for severall days previous to his death & while on this journey she frequently heard the said Barnes Bridges say that he ~~would~~ ^{would} to make his will & that he ment to give all his property to his wife and she the said Sally Boone states that while on the journey aforesaid she often heard the said Barnes Bridges say that he wanted to get home & make his will that he intended his wife should have he had.
