I do give to my three eldest sons namely, Moses, Alexander and Esram, one Dollar each, to Thomas M. my next son ten Dollars to my next son Daniel fifty Dollars all the rest of my children is to receive an equal proportion of all the rest of my ~~children's~~ personal property to be administered on by my wife or some person of her choice and also an equal division in the land to be sold at twelve months credit at her death in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal the day and

Pursuant to an order from the Madison County Court made at their December Term 1818, appointing us Commissioners to divide the slaves of Joseph Ryland deceased between the heirs of said Decedent, we convened at the dwelling house of Joseph Barnett, and being first sworn by Archibald Woods Esq. and having said slaves brought before us and having evaluated them, we divided them into seven lots agreeable to the number of said Decedent's heirs. There being twelve slaves in all, valued to \$6800 which we divided into seven parts to be equal to \$900 and having numbered the lots of slaves and balloted for each of the heirs to make the following report of each ones dividend.

To Parker & Goddard and Catharine his wife late Catharine Ryland, ~~is~~ allotted two of the slaves (wret), Sylvia and Henry, valued to \$1000.

To John F. Ryland is allotted two slaves Polly and Nelson, valued to \$1000. To Elizabeth Ryland is allotted two slaves Samuel and a child called a merica valued to \$700, and to be paid in addition \$100. from John F. Ryland, and \$100. by said John F. Ryland, Guardian to Edwin Ryland, to make said Elizabeth's lot of slaves equal to the average amount of each here.

To Edwin Ryland is allotted one slave called Quin's field valued to \$1000. To Joannah Ryland is allotted one man slave called James valued to \$750, and \$100. to be paid her by Parker & Goddard and Catharine his wife, and \$50. to be paid by Joseph Barnett Guardian to Nancy Ryland to make said Joannah's Division equal with the average to each here.

To James Ryland is allotted three slaves viz. Rebecca and her child and a small boy called Moses valued to \$700.

To Nancy Ryland is allotted ~~three~~ ^{two} slaves called Sotensen and Menah valued to \$850.

at the rest of my Estate both real and personal to sell or otherwise dispose of as
she in her judgment may think best and at her death divide it amongst our
children as she may think best it is also my will and desire that my two daughters
above named should have their full share of my Estate as though they had not the articles
above mentioned it is likewise my desire that my wife Jane should be my Executrix
and act as above mentioned herein my hand and seal this 20th day of December 1816
