Hannah French have and enjoy forever two beds and bedding and all the furniture belonging to them which said beds and furniture did originally belong to my said wife for our marriage and thirty It is my will and desire that my said wife have and enjoy forever my negro woman Lydia provided she pays over at her death to my estate Two hundred dollars for her increase and in case the said Lydia should die then my said wife is to pay nothing fourthly It is my will and desire that my said wife have the use of the one hundred and fifty acres of land on which I now live and also all the personal lands I may die and bequeath her for and during her life and after her death to be equally divided among my three daughters Sarah Park Elizabeth McNamee and Ruth Doughty fifthly It is my will and desire that Elancy West and Mary Harper each have fifty acres out of my estate and more and lastly I do hereby constitute and appoint John Ried to with my wife Hannah French my Executor of this my last will and testament In testimony whereof I have written at my hand and seal this 5<sup>th</sup> day of August 1812 In witness of the words (all lands I may die Scared and bound of testator before signed)

any timber from the land nor is she to let any person to move on the lands during  
her widowhood also a negro boy George and a girl Zemer a to be hers during her  
widowhood, and at her death the whole of the property they ~~belong~~ to my wife  
to be sold by my Executors at a credit of twelve months and the money  
arising from the sale when deducted to be equally divided between my  
children hereafter named to wit, Nancy, Emily, Honor, Peter, Henry, Elizabeth  
Sarah, Rachael, Rebecca & Anna and I do hereby nominate and appoint Lewis  
Benton <sup>Esq</sup> and my son Joseph Loxton my Executors of this my last will and testa-
