Agreeable to an Order from Madison County Court to us directed bearing date at Request before 1812 now we George Sleorn Stephen Sally & James Temple being first duly sworn to divide the Kansas Estate of William Hamm Deceased between the legates of said deceased has proceeded & divided the landed Estate of William Hamm in the County of Madison and State of Kentucky on both sides of Silver Creek amongst the legates of said Deceased and makes Report of the same in the following manner—

In the first place we do lay off and divide to Thomas Hamm a minor legate of William Hamm a lot ^{no 1} lying and being on the north side of Silver Creek joining lands of James Bogue & others Beginning at a Hickory & Sassafras mark T on the Bank of Silver Creek at the lower end of the upper bottom thence running a division of line between lot no 1 and lot no 2 Belonging to Henry Hamm north fifty six East two hundred & twenty six poles to an Elm Hickory & Buck mark T on the line dividing from James Bogue thence his line south thirty seven coats One hundred & twenty five poles to a white Oak supposed to be Bogue's corner on a branch thence ^{down} and with the different meanders of said branch to two Elms & a Sycamore at its mouth thence down and with the meanders of Silver Creek to the Beginning Containing fifty eight & half acres In the second place we do lay off likewise to Henry Hamm a minor legate of William Hamm Deceased a lot ^{no 2} lying and being on the north side of Creek below Thomas Hamm's land Beginning at an Elm on the north bank of Silver Creek marked T thence by the division of lines between Henry Hamm and lot ^{no 3} belonging to William Stevenson fifty three

Poles to a hickory on the side of a hill thence south nearly one hundred & twenty eight poles to two Sugar trees and a hickory marked T and on the line of Thomas Hamm tot no 1 thence said line south fifty six west eighty nine poles to a hickory & a sugar tree marked T Beginning corner to Thomas Hamm on the north bank of Silver Creek thence down with the meanders of the same to the Beginning containing fifty six acres In the third place we do lay off and divide to William Alborn a legatee of William Hamm deceased a tot no 2 Beginning at an Elm pointed by two lines on the north bank of Silver Creek marked T thence to divide to no 3 and a tot no 4 Belonging to James Shapp East forty two poles to a hickory & honey locust thence south sixty five east fifty poles to two Sugar trees a dogwood & a Red Oak thence south eighty east one hundred & fifty two poles to two dogwoods & a hornbeam on the line of Thomas Hamm thence said line south fifty six west twenty two poles to two Sugar trees & a hickory marked T corner to Henry Hamm tot no 2 thence with said line north sixty west one hundred & twenty eight poles to a Hickory on the side of a hill corner to Henry Hamm thence west fifty three poles to an Elm on the north bank of Silver Creek Beginning corner to said Henry Hamm thence down and with the meanders of said creek to the Beginning containing fifty seven & half acres In the fourth place we do lay off and divide to James Shapp a legatee of William Hamm deceased a tot no 5 lying in being on the north side of Silver Creek joining lands of Thomas Smith & others Beginning at a Chestnut on the north bank of Silver Creek thence by land of Thomas Smith South East thirty two poles to a Sugar tree thence north twenty eight east seven poles to an Elm thence East sixty one poles to a hickory Smith's corner thence by land
