 the following named eight (8) Negroes, eight (8) Negroes
 Wilson, Mary, Robert, Little, Judah and Joseph which we
 have estimated to be worth two thousand eight hundred and
 fifty one dollar, being twenty one dollar and sixty cents
 more than her just proportion of the negroes divided which
 her share must account for with some in future. There is
 likewise three negroes and other property on the muddy creek
 plantation which have not been divided, being subject to another
 person during the present year.

We will further state that the property belonging to the said
 husband and debt previously due against his estate
 including five shares in the Richmond & Orange Bank, three
 thousand two hundred and eighty four dollars and is payable
 out. But one of this part of the estate, the necessary expenses
 of liquidating and selling assets the same together with the
 due from David Slivers & Co. must be settled this
 impossible to ascertain with precision the exact sum the widow
 will be entitled to until discovered by a settlement of the
 Executor. Being with the Court when such settlement is effected
 and the ~~same~~ ~~remaining~~ in the hands of the Executor. Being
 ascertained the widow will be entitled to receive and third
 part thereof.
