1st After my decease I wish my executors hereafter to be named to pay
all my just debts and Funeral Expenses—

2nd I give and bequeath to my daughter Isabella Taylor one thousand
dollars in common currency money of Kentucky—

3rd I give and bequeath to my daughter Fanny Bartleson one
thousand dollars in common currency money of Kentucky—

4th It is my will and desire that whereas my brother James Bogie
and myself are in partnership in the great saw and horse mills
that he should have one third part of the profits and interest of
said Mills according to a specific bond of mine held by said
James Bogie and it is to be understood that this clause of
my will is only to seem to him the same immediate and
privilege that the said bond was intended to do and no more
It is further to be understood that the said James Bogie is to
have one third part of the Expenses of all necessary repairs of
the said mills with the said saw &c. with his compliance
with the above provisions and also provided that he nor his
heirs shall never sell the above interest in said mills to any
person or persons except to my son James Bogie & Isaac
