I then I give and bequeath unto my beloved sister Jane and my beloved Brother William and give them all my half of the part of said and improve mostly thereon in the Town of Richmond which I hold jointly with Samuel Parish who is now in the possession of the same. I give and bequeath to my beloved sister Eldender my bay horse and also one hundred dollars in cash should there be any money remaining of my estate when I shall be at last satisfying the before promising my will and desire is that it be equally divided among my brothers and sisters excluding my half brothers and sisters. It is also my will and desire that my interest in my Father's estate except the Land which I have sold to brother Barret Turner be equally divided among my brothers and sisters excluding my half brothers and sisters. One lastly I do hereby nominate and appoint Barret Turner and Spurre Turner my Executors to this my last will and Testament hereby revoking all others. In the name of God I Thomas Mally of the County of Madison and State of Kentucky being weak in body but of sound mind and memory do hereby constitute and appoint this to be my last will and Testament hereby revoking all others by me made. First all my just debts to be punctually paid. Secondly I give and bequeath to my well beloved wife Lucinda Mally an equal half of the land I now have on including the house to be so laid off that each part shall have an equal quantity of timber as near as may be also one equal half of all the household and kitchen furniture to be received by her at the appraisement also one third part of the stock of horses cattle and sheep to be allotted to her (as for me) all my stock of hogs my ruggen and gear my wheat fan and all my Farming Utensils. I also I do bequeath to her my negro boy George my negro woman Mary and

her two children Anthony and Rhoda for her to possess until they arrive at the age of thirty years when it is my desire that they be set free. George is about sixteen years old Mary twenty one her son Anthony was born the 26th January 1848 her daughter Rhoda was born the 11th of June in the present year also one hundred dollars in cash to her and her heirs to possess and enjoy the negroes excepted forever. It is also my desire that my black woman Dinah continue with my wife and be maintained by her during life. It is my will that my two negro men named Spencer and Tony shall go out from next April May and be allowed fifty dollars each out of my estate. I then to my daughter John Mally son Isaac I bequeath fifty dollars (I then to my daughter Martha and sister in Kentucky and Indiana namely Julia Mally John Mally Esther Maria Francis Ann Miller Elizabeth Butler Anna Hutton Spathy Thacker and Polly Rippetts all I give and bequeath two thirds of the remaining part of my estate after the aforementioned bequests are deducted to be divided equally between them. It is also my desire that the remaining third part be equally divided among my first misfeasors namely Sarah Richardson Gellbach Esther Ballard and Hannah Quinn and it is my ^{will} ~~desire~~ that if any controversy should arise amongst my Legals that they refer such controversy to three disinterested men of sound judgement to be chosen by the parties and the third to settle their claims and their decision to be final as if done in any Court of justice and lastly I appoint Thomas Jarman John Mally John Mally Joshua Quinn and Hiram Quinn or any three of them Executors of this my last will and Testament. In Testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal at my real this seventh day of October Eighteen hundred and one (Interlinea before signed)
