the estate of Abner L. Little, was returned and ordered

In the name of God. Amen. I William Adams of the County of Madison and State of Kentucky being of sound and disposing mind and memory but weak and low in body health and strength and knowing that all men are born ~~meant~~ to die do make and record this my last will and Testament—

First I give my legs to the suit, from whence it came and
to be buried in a plain but decent Manner, - and my heart to God

Second My Will and desire is that all my just debts, be paid; and
to settle the same that all my penitible property to wit on each
credit as my executors hereinafter named may come expecting —
Third Give and bequeath unto my son William one silver
plate, and my rifle gun, to be delivered to him when he shall have
attained the age of twenty one year.
Fourth Agree and bequeath unto my son James one silver
gun, to be delivered to him when he shall have attained the age
of twenty one year.
Fifth Give and bequeath unto my daughter Sally one set of
silver two spoons that I now have, to be delivered to her when she
shall have attained the age of twenty one year or shall have
married.
Sixth It is my Will and desire, that all the residue of my estate
after the payment of my just debts, and the proper division
aforesaid shall be equally divided between my said three
children, William James and Sally each one of them to
receive its portion, as they shall respectively attain the age of
twenty one year, and to effect this I bind unto the more aforesaid,
and to secure the permanent interest of my children I do give
Will and desire that the whole of my landed estate of which I
may be seized and possessed or in any way entitled either in Law
or Equity, as well as my personal property, except my negroes,
may be sold by my executors herein after appointed, (or one of
them as shall qualify, and not under this my said Will) at
such time and upon such credit as they or he as the case may be
may deem best, the proceeds of said sale of my landed estate
giving Bond with approved security for the payment of the pur-
chase money to two interest from the date of the sale and the
interest to be paid annually — and it is further my Will and
desire that the whole of the interest accruing in manner aforesaid
from the sale of my land, as well as the interest upon
the sale of my personal estate if any shall remain after the
payment of my debts, I do desire that annual profits or hire of
my Negroes shall be appropriated towards the raising support-
ing and schooling of my said children and of the interest, prop-
erty or hire aforesaid shall not be sufficient for that purpose
then so much of the principle of my estate as circumstances may
render necessary for that purpose shall be appropriated
and for the purpose of carrying the foregoing premises into
effect, I do hereby name constitute and appoint John C. Hollis
and John C. Sturges of the County and State aforesaid Executors
of this my last Will and Testament, and also bequeathing to my
said children William James, and Sally, until they shall
respectively attain the age of twenty one year — and of either the

And the name of Geo. Simon Samuel Brown of Madison County and State of Kentucky do hereby declare this to be my last will and testament, hereby revoking all former wills by me heretofore made.

In the first place I give and bequeath unto my daughter Mary Newland one dollar having heretofore advanced to her all I intend giving her.

Secondly, I give and bequeath unto my daughter's husband, J. M. Negro (Roman) called Sarah to her and her heirs forever. Thirdly I give and bequeath to my son Jeremiah Brown one dollar having heretofore advanced to him all I intend giving him. 4th I give and bequeath unto my son Elijah Brown one dollar having heretofore advanced to him all I intend.

5th I give and bequeath unto my son David Brown the land purchased of William Gray being the land whereon I formerly lived lying on the west side of Big Creek.

6th I give and bequeath unto my daughter Nancy McQueen one dollar having advanced to her heretofore, all I intend giving her. 7th I give and bequeath to the heirs of my husband Geo. Brown one dollar having heretofore on the lifetime of my said Geo. Brown advanced to him all I intend giving him.

8th I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary one dollar having heretofore given her all I intend giving her. 9th It is my will and desire that my beloved wife, Mildred, remain on the plantation where I now live and as her natural life or widowhood, and that the black and negroes to be by my Executor kept on the plantation and that out of the proceeds arising from the farm my wife and I have a comfortable support during her natural life or widowhood and that the balance of the proceeds arising from the farm should my Executor make use of in raising and educating my children by my last wife.

giving them a good English Education. 10th It is my will and desire that my Negroes not to be sold but to remain as all my children by my last wife become of age that if it is possible they be equally divided between them.

11th It is my will and desire that my Negro (Man Jupiter) be permitted at my death to make choice of which of my children by my first wife he pleases to live with and that the same be made choice of I give and bequeath him and his heirs forever.

12th I give and bequeath unto my son Andrew my tract of land lying on the creek to him and his heirs forever.

13th I give and bequeath unto my son Joseph the tract of land whereon I now live at the death or intestancy of my wife which ever may first happen.

14th It is my will and desire that residue of my estate both real and personal be equally divided between my children by my last wife to wit. Andrew, Joseph, and David to be equally divided amongst them when they become of age etc of them.

Lastly I do hereby constitute and appoint John Puer and David Brown my Executors of this my last will and testament. In Testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my Seal to this my last will and testament this 10th day of May 1819.
