Amen I William Moore being weak of body out of respect, sound and disposing mind and knowing that it is expedient for all men and to do, do make this to be my last will and testament hereby revoking and making null and void all other writings, writings or wills, pending in any Court, my last will and testament, made before this — and first it is my will and I give this all my freehold, to pass out of my personal estate — a few of my debt, and leave that my beloved wife Elizabeth Moore, do and dispose my tract of land whereon I now live with all the appurtenances, during her natural life — then it is my will and I give that after the death of my wife Elizabeth Moore, that the whole of my land be sold to the best advantage and the money equally divided between the whole of my children — but if my wife Elizabeth Moore should die before my youngest child become of lawful age, I leave the said land to my eldest daughter and each of my children as they become of age and receive their equal share —

I then do give my will and desire that my beloved child and John Moore, James Moore, Walter Moore, George Moore, Henry Moore, and William Moore, should possess that said tract the land be sold, that they use same and pay for the name of each my horse, land — then it is my will and desire that my daughter Elizabeth Moore, William Moore, George Moore, Henry Moore, and John Moore, should have and use each tract to be equal in value to any of the other lands that are mentioned here —

I then do give my will and desire that all the rest of my personal estate that I have and the like of my beloved wife Elizabeth Moore to sell and use in the maintenance, raising and educating my minor children to be raised and brought up in a decent manner and to be raised and brought up in a decent manner —

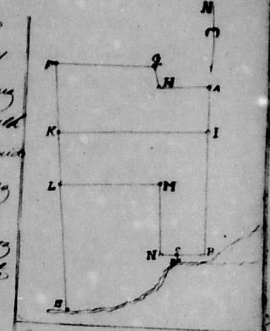

Security and Manumission the first day of April 1802 This instrument of justice was produced to the Court and moved to be the last will and testament of (William Moore) by the oath of James Moore and George Bernard both subscribing (Witnesses) and ordered to be recorded and the same has been done accordingly.

In pursuance of an order of the County Court for Madison County (made at their December Term 1801) to viz. do make to allot the slaves of Henry Broadway late Henry Walker Widow and child of James Walker — who being first sworn do allot unto the said Henry Broadway and hundred and twelve acres her share in the tract of land whereon the said James died which 112 acres is bounded as follows to wit Beginning at a stake and pointing on the South side of a small branch in Sudley Swamp — belly line at I thence South 88° East 188 paces to a stake and a bushberry and a hickory (marked as pointing in the line of) thence North 88° East 188 paces to a small black walnut at L in said line thence now lying North 88° East 188 paces to a stake at M thence South 88° East 78 paces to a stake and a three white oak (marked as pointing at N thence North 88° East 68 paces to a sugar tree corner to Sudley Swamp at R thence with the line North 88° East 154 paces to the Beginning. — And in pursuance of said order we do allot unto the said Henry Broadway late Henry Walker Widow of the said James Walker Widow her share of said estate in slaves to wit Beverly a negro (man) Rich a negro Boy about ten years old and David a boy child about two years old — In witness of the above we have hereunto set our hands this 27th day of February 1802
