 enjoying good health of body so make this my last will and
 testament, I will and bequeath to my sister Lettice Daugherty
 all my part of the land on which we now live including
 that part which I purchased of Stephen Gossow making about
 one hundred and thirty two and 2/3 acres, I also will and bequeath
 to my said sister Lettice Daugherty all my part to a tract of
 750 acres lying on the waters of Kentucky creek in Madison
 Co. Ky my part being two hundred and fifty acres, I also
 will and bequeath to my said sister Lettice Daugherty four
 negro slaves to wit, Milt, Sydney, William and Hannah and
 Caroline, and I also will and bequeath to my said sister
 Lettice Daugherty all my chattels personal of every kind
 whatsoever now and to the same which we now possess in
 common the said negroes to sell to me from the estate
 of my father Thomas Daugherty and in fee simple and
 and I will and bequeath I the sum to my sister Lettice
 Daugherty as above during her life and at her death to do
 what she pleases with said land negroes and with the
 following exceptions (viz) should my sister Polly Gossow

have any living children I wish my sister Lillies good time to time
to make them some presents say at sixteen years of age and at twenty
One year of age as follows at sixteen years of age \$200. then then
be one or more children they are to have my two hundred and
fifty acres of land on muddy Creek named above, and at twenty
One year of age they are to have half of the negroes I did disposed
of And in case my sister Sally Gossens should be left a
widow and at that time have no living children I will and
bequeath to her my said land on muddy Creek and half
of the negroes I now possess, and to my brother in law
Stephen Gossens I grant full free acquittal for all the monies
he has paid of me. And as above respect to what he and I possess
of land I bought a said Gossens has bought the land being said
Gossens part of the home tract of two hundred acres, which said
Stephen has been Considerable, provided the said Gossens
make to my sister Lillies when called on a due and no
simple to his part of the home tract being only six and 3/4 acres for
which I have no real or written obligation and provided also
he give up to my sister Lillies lawfully my negro boy William
more in his possession upon my said sister or her agent offering
him her money for that hundred and seventy five dollars payable
as per article in two years at being my part for the said Gossens
part of the tract he now lives on, but in case the said Gossens
should refuse to make a due to my sister as above or refuse
to give up the boy William as above, or should go to law
I endeavour to break this will by in that case or either of
them, I will to my sister Lillies lawfully all my land, negroes
I shall and money in the hands of Stephen Gossens to have
