The County Court held for Madison County on Monday the 4th day of May 1829 this Sale Bill of the estate of James White deceased returned and ordered to be recorded and the same has been duly done accordingly

In the name of God Amen! I John Broadus Clerk of the County of Madison and State of Kentucky being made and informed in body but of perfect mind and memory and calling to mind the mortality of my soul and knowing that it is ordained for all men once to die do make an order in my last will and testament in

the following manner: I desire that all my just debt to be paid by my Executors hereinafter named.  
2<sup>d</sup> I Bequeath unto my beloved wife Mary Broadus so long as she remains my widow the following negroes to wit: Sampson, Ross, Anthony, Gabriel, Menny and all Menny's children and all children's children, also my farm where we now live together with all appurtenances belonging thereto including household and kitchen furniture, farming etc. and all that is left after my son Thomas Broadus shall have received a good Bed and furnished a cow and calf and also after my daughter Patsy Broadus shall have received a horse, a good Bed and furniture to make them equal to such property as my Daughters that are married have received. But should my wife Mary Broadus marry again then some my will is that she shall have the Lease of only one half the property above mentioned during her natural life.  
3<sup>d</sup> I have given and bequeathed unto my daughter Rutharine Price a negro girl named Rachael and her increase forever.  
4<sup>th</sup> I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Phaneas Broadus a negro woman named Phillis and her increase forever.  
5<sup>th</sup> I give and bequeath unto my son John Broadus a negro man Philip to be for his use forever.  
6<sup>th</sup> I gave to my daughter Lucy Simms after she was married a negro woman named Nancy to be for the use of her husband.  
7<sup>th</sup> I give and bequeath unto my daughter Nancy Munday a negro woman named Eliza and her increase forever.  
8<sup>th</sup> I gave to my daughter Polly Broadus after she was married a negro woman named Wannah to be for the use of her husband.  
9<sup>th</sup> My wish and will is that my son Andrew Broadus shall remain with his mother and be supported by the property left in her hand and after his mother's death or marriage my will is that my Executor shall do provide out of the estate left in his mother's hand that one thousand Dollars in gold or silver shall be put out at interest and the interest of said sum shall be applied annually to the support of Andrew during his lifetime, and after the death of my son Andrew the one thousand Dollars is to be equally divided among my children or their Lawful heirs except my daughter Rutharine Price or her heirs.
