Monday night July 11th day 1825

Being at Mr Thomas Esperson and heard him the said Tho^s Esperson tell Mr Lewis Francis that he wanted his property to be disposed of and was also called out to take notice of the same which was as followeth - that after all his the said Thomas Esperson lived with him paid that he wanted his beloved wife Susan Esperson to have all his Estate and at her death for her to settle Alexander Francis his step grand son and agreed by married her provided he the said Alexander Francis continued to be a faithful grand son to her and her helpless condition and all the balance of his Estate at his wife death to be his daughter Mary Ann Esperson. He showed his daughter Mary Ann did without and heir that he wanted the same Estate to pass to Lewis and Tho^s Francis children and Susan Scotts children after he the said Thomas Esperson had made the above statement he then asked Mr Lewis Francis to commit this same to paper

Agreed a branch to B thence to C. D and down a branch to E thence up a branch to E thence to H thence down a branch to I thence down another branch to the beginning represents Lawrence Benthly's tract of land containing 129 acres,

At the undersigned, commissioners appointed by the County Court for the County of Madison to attend unto the lands and estate of the aforesaid Lawrence Benthly her right of dower and the aforesaid tract of land do attest unto the said widow, (Died Mary of Jones) that part of the aforesaid tract of land cutted and bounded as follows and beginning at a black lead line run at C on the South East side of the wide road thence with the road 160 or 11 poles 136 or 30 poles 136 to 132 poles to a stake at B thence 132 or 13 poles to a stake at I thence 117 or 107 poles to a stake at H thence 14 or 139 poles to a stake at L thence 180 or 67 poles to a stake at M with an elm and locust line marked as markers and the branch thence down the same the remainder thence to the fork at H thence up as pointers thence 116 or 138 poles to the beginning can containing 129 acres also there is three negro slaves belonging to said Estate Lewis Henry May and William Henry we value at \$140 and Mary and William at \$350 each in gold or silver coin amounting in the whole to \$840. The widow and attests unto her the signed lay ordered by her paying \$70 in like money to the sheriff of the said Lawrence Benthly
