children to wit Harriet and Adeline valued at one hundred
and twenty five dollars the two and entitled to the further
sum of one hundred and twenty one dollars ninety six and
three quarter cents. Polly Curtis drew a negro girl called
Betty valued at three hundred dollars being fifty
dollars three and one quarter cents more than was her
portion Julia Curtis drew a negro girl called Hannah
valued at three hundred dollars which was

Fifty three dollars three and one quarter cents more than was her proportion. Miam Curtis drew a negro girl called Maria valued at one hundred dollars being one hundred and forty six dollars and a minority and three quarter cents less than was his proportion of S. Hume. Nicholas Curtis drew a negro girl Betty valuation two hundred and twenty dollars which was twenty six dollars and a minority and three quarter cents less than his proportion. Elice Curtis drew a negro man ~~named~~ Dennis valuation three hundred and thirty dollars being eighty three dollars three and one fourth cents more than was her proportion of S. Hume. Elice Curtis drew a negro woman called Sophia valued at one hundred and fifty dollars being twenty six dollars and a minority and three fourth cents less than her proportion. John Curtis drew a negro girl called Sally valuation three hundred and fifty dollars being one hundred and thirty dollars three and one fourth cents more than was his proportion of S. Hume. James Curtis drew a negro girl called Hannah valuation two hundred and fifty dollars being three hundred and thirty dollars three and one fourth cents more than his proportion of S. Hume.

The names and valuation of said negroes allotted as aforesaid are as follows to wit. Negro man Daniel valued at five hundred dollars Negro man Mite valued at three hundred dollars. Negro woman Sarah valued at three hundred dollars. Negro girl Summa at two hundred and fifty dollars. Estimated value yet lacking eight dollars and one third of a dollar of being one equal third part of the slaves as by us valued.

At February Court 1814 The assignment of Power to attorney for Widow of John Curtis dec'd was returned passed examined and ordered to be recorded.
