

In the name of god amen Nicholas Davis knowing it is appointed one for all men to die and being weak in body but of sound mind and perfect memory do make and ordain this to be my last will and Testament in manner and form following that is to say first I recommend my soul to god who gave it and by body to be buried decently at the discretion of my Executors and touching my worldly Estate I dispose of it in manner following to wit I give will and bequest to my son George V Davis all this land and plantations which I now under being two hundred Acres be this same more or less one negro man name George and one feather bed and furniture and a bed room and a great deal of the main part of my Estate shall be and be able in the forepart and for the use of my wife Rebecca Davis during her life as long to her and at her decease to be equally divided amongst all my Children that may then be living It being my will that in that division my negro man Isaac should not be sold to a stranger but should be sold to that one of my Children who will give most for him And if my wife Rebecca Davis should not chose to stand to this my will then I give her one a cow and three or four feather beds and furniture and also a Chest of Drawers and every thing that is in it and I do hereby Revoke constitute and appoint my son George V Davis Executor to this my last will and Testament In Witness whereof I have here set my hand and this 24th day of October 1804

At a Court held for Morgan County the 12th of March 1805
 The last will and Testament of Nicholas Davis deceased was produced in Court and sworn to by the Executor George V Davis therein named proved by the Oath of the witnesses thereto and ordered to be Recorded and on the Motion of the Executor Certificate is granted him for obtaining a Probate thereof in due form upon giving Security whereupon he together with James Ward and James Buckhagen entered into and acknowledged bond in the penalty of Six hundred pounds Conditioned as the law directs
