

227 continue unmarried and continue to live in this County but if she shall marry, or remove from this County before that time, then a division of the property to be made; or if my wife and my executor shall by mutual consent agree that it would be better for the Children the division may at any time be made when ever my property may be divided, viz, at the arrival of that time aforesaid, or in either of the events named, my will is that my wife shall have in absolute right one eighth part of my estate, and the remainder be equally divided amongst my Children then living - If any of my Children shall arrive at full age, or shall marry, or shall be bound out, before the division be made as before provided, in such case my wife is not to be bound to contribute to the maintenance of such Child or Children - I hereby appoint my brother James M. Smith Executor of this will - And I desire that when my said Executor qualify no Security be required of him - My will is that my property be not appraised - Signed Sealed this 29th January 1820 -

To all and to whom these present writings shall come I George M. McCormick of Mercer County & State of Kentucky do hereby declare this my ~~last~~ last will and testament in manner and form herein written after my Burialling expenses is paid and I should get two thousand acres of land from the State of Virginia for my Services in the war to be laid off between the Tolia and Little Miami Rivers in the Ohio State -

I give to my son Abraham M. McCormick two hundred and fifty acres to him and his heirs and assigns forever -

I give to my son William M. McCormick five hundred acres of the same claim to him his heirs and assigns forever -

I give to my son Isaac M. McCormick five hundred acres of the same claim to him his heirs and assigns for ever -

I give to my daughter Nancy M. McCormick two hundred & fifty acres of the same land to her and her heirs or assigns for ever -

I give to my Daughter Comfort Goddard two hundred and fifty acres of the same land to her and her heirs or assigns for ever -

I give to my Daughter Polly M. Graham two hundred and fifty acres to her and her heirs or assigns forever -

I give to my son James M. McCormick that fifty dollars I lent him, but fifteen

dollars he is to pay his brother Isaac McCormick. My desire is that if this land is claimed to be land of quantity and quality. So that all may have as vague a share as can be. Given under my hand and seal this tenth day of January one thousand eight hundred and twenty. Anno Domini 1820 —

Codicils to the within Will

McCormick all money which may be coming to me from the United States as compensation to me for my service as Captain in the Revolutionary War for the purpose of paying my debts as far as it will go. Now I give to my son George McCormick also to my daughter Elizabeth Cresson Sally Cresson one dollar each also to my son John McCormick one dollar also to my son Andrew McCormick one dollar.
