In obedience to an order of Clerks Court to us Sheriffs we have with the advice and consent of the Guardians of said the Legatee and James Adams husband to Elizabeth Woods one of the Legatee we have proceeded to Divide the Land of James Woods Esq which is 400 Acres lying on Salt River in two surveys one divided Each survey in three parts which makes six shares it appeared to us to Divide it into seven would Injure all the Legatee by it smallness and James Adams being present agreed with the Guardians to take the worth of the seventh part of the Land in other part the Guardians paying in such property as suited him to take and the Guardians to wait with the other six Legatee till they could get out of their part of the Estate Each to pay an Equal share to make up the seventh James Adams agreed with the Guardians in the value of the 400 Acres of Land at nine shillings & pence that is 180 pounds the seventh part of that £25 14 3/4 the six share in the Land was drawn by Lot No

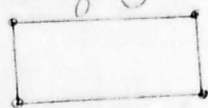

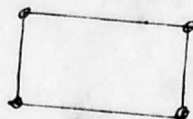

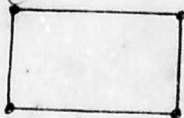
