In the Name of God Amen. I James Spud of Mercer County and State of Kentucky of sound mind and memory do make this my last will and testament hereby revoking all other will heretofore made by me

I will unto my beloved wife Mary Spud the plantation whereon I live containing about two hundred and thirty six acres being the land deeded to me by James Harrod and John Bowman during her life time in lieu of her dower in land And I give the said land to my son Henry Spud or his representative after his mothers death I also ~~also~~ give to my son Henry Spud and his representatives all the land that I hold in Mercer County and Garrard County and that are not sold before my death also the remainder of a tract ~~land~~ ^{Thos Harrod} I hold on ~~the~~ creek which is only a few acres I lend to my wife the following negroes with their increase To wit Ben Tom Powell Jim Agga Nancy Maria Nancy Annie

Lucy Harrod and Liza and I give ~~the said two~~ ^{at his mothers death} ~~also give to my son Henry~~ twelve negroes to my son Henry all the other negroes that I shall die possessed of except Murea and his children.

I desire that my son Henry and family shall live with his mother upon my whole estate on which we now live, and that he shall take good care of her during her life and shall live at her discretion and shall possess in common all my lands and negus and all his lands & negroes which he shall look after under his direction and I give them my waggon fan steele and stock of all kinds as also all the corn meat house hold goods plantation utensils and every thing belonging to the house & farm and if they cannot agree to live together, a division shall be made of the fan waggon steele corn meat growing crops stock utensils household goods &c and Henry shall have one third and his mother shall have two thirds during his life all which shall fall to Henry at his Mothers Death

I hold fourteen hundred Acres of land on the River about fifty miles below the falls which was patented to William Preston and conveyed to me by James Harrod and John Breckenridge it being Ann Harrods Settlement and pursuant to this ~~above said Ann Harrods Settlement~~ ^{and pursuant to this} ~~above said Ann Harrods Settlement~~ ^{and pursuant to this} I desire to dispose of as follows I desire that the Ann Harrods Settlement may be divided equally as to quantity and quality I give to my grand son

James Speed Hopkins and his heirs & the upper half of said settlement the division to be made by a line beginning at the River bank parallel with the line of the old survey. If my said grand son should die under age and without an heir I give the said land to his sister Sally Alexander Hopkins and if she and his brother should die without an heir and under age I give said land to my grand daughter Polly Rankin Elizabeth Rankin and Juliet Rankin or such of them as shall come of age or have an heir to be divided equally. I give the lower half of the said settlement and preemption of Ann Harrod disposed of by Doct^r Adam Rankin or divided as he may think best in an equal manner between my three granddaughters Mary Rankin Elizabeth Rankin and Juliet Rankin and if the said Adam Rankin should think it proper to sell the same for the benefit of his daughters this shall empower him to make a conveyance and divide the money Equally between his daughters or their representatives. I give two fifths of the said Ann Harrod's preemption to be disposed of as follows I bind the said two fifths of said preemption at the lower end to my executors during the life of John Hopkins to be rented off for the

benefit of my daughter Polly S Hopkins and after the death of John Hopkins I bind the said land to my daughter Polly S Hopkins for her use during her life I give the said two fifths of Ann Harrod's preemption to my grand sons John Speed Smith and Gay William Smith or their heirs representatives and if either the said John Speed Smith or Gay William Smith should die under age and without an heir then the survivor and his representatives shall have the same and that immediately after their mothers death this two fifths of the preemption is to be laid off at the lower end adjoining the settlement by a line to begining at the River and running out parallel with the old patent line. I give my son John Speed one fifth part of said Ann Harrod's preemption it being the middle lot of said preemption to be laid off by a line to begin at the river and out parallel with the old patent line. I give to my ^{two} grand sons William Rankin and Adam Rankin and their representatives two fifths of the said Ann Harrod's preemption to be laid off at the upper end by a line beginning at the river running out with the line of John Speed and parallel to the patent line if the said William Rankin or Adam Rankin should die without well or heir I give their land to the survivor ~

I have heretofore given and do give to my two sons Thomas and John Speed fourteen hundred acres of land which I hold by entry on grant under below the other tract of fifteen hundred acres which I gave them at the said fee also three hundred and seventy five acres on Beargrass and upwards of seven hundred acres on Lynn camp creek it being all that will remain above James Wyatt when his tract is laid off

I give to my son Thomas Speed two hundred acres of land on Lynn camp creek lying below James Wyatt which I had formerly sold to John Shively and took again for which I never made a title

I give to my son John Speed all the interest I hold in and to Manslick and ~~land~~ ^{my agent} ~~land~~ ^{land} there to as my son John has bought and paid for his brother James part thereof

I give to my son Henry Speed all out standing debts that shall be due to me and all the money that shall be on hand when I die and direct he shall pay all my out standing debts I shall then owe I also charge my son Henry with the fulfilment of two agreements one of which I made with John Hann and the other with Robert Nicholson both for land and I do direct that my ^{son} Henry shall pay all damages that shall be recovered against my Estate for either of the said agreements:

John Cowan gave me a side of leather for which consideration I give to Samuel Davis all my little to ~~which~~ ^{which} land I hold within his living. I give to my sons Thomas John & James all my estate of every kind not otherwise given by this will out of which they are to pay all damages that may come against my estate for lands sold in my life time except for the lands sold John Hann and Robert Nicholson.

I lend to my wife four negroes to wit Maria Joe Franky & Crissy during her life to be disposed of as she thinks proper as I have only a life estate in them and after the death of my wife these negroes shall go to the use of Polly & Hopkins.

I appoint my sons Thomas John James and Henry & my friend Thomas Allen to be my executors of this last will and testament and do empower them or either of them to sell my land given in the last cause of this will for the purpose or fulfilling this will they are to make deeds for all lands sold by me and not conveyed in my life time according to the tenor of the sales and being suits for the fulfilment of all contracts
