In the name of God Amen. I John Durham of Allen County and State of Kentucky being in a perfect state of mind and memory but knowing the unavoidable dissolution of all flesh do make Constitutions and bequeath this as my last Will and Testament First I recommend my soul to God who gave it and my body to the earth to be buried in a decent Christian manner at the discretion of my friends and attorney

Widely possessed. I give and dispose in the following manner (to wit) I will that all my last to said John I give and bequeath to my well beloved wife Martha Durham whom I now live, together with all my personal estate (except such as I shall otherwise dispose of together with the profits of my other plantation whom Joshua Davis formerly lived during his natural life or widowhood, also I give him my Negro man Joseph during the same term, and at his death or marriage to be sold, also I give and bequeath to my son in Law Sumner Lewis all my right and title to five hundred acres of land lying on the South side of Cicking River near the upper blue lick, which I purchased of Samuel Hinton (which the said Lewis and the said Lewis has received and disposed of for him and his heirs forever I give to my son John Durham all my right and title to my tract of land on the North side of Cicking River containing four hundred and seventy acres (in the same term or life to him and his heirs forever, I give to my son Thomas Durham all my right and title to one hundred acres of land which he formerly lived to him and his heirs forever I give to my son Benjamin
