The said Guardian also that the Estate of the decedent has never been divided nor the Widows dower allotted her and he has considered it most beneficial to interest of said heirs that ~~that~~ it should as yet remained so as the farm which constitutes a considerable part of the estate would not admit of division to any advantage

The Estate consists of the aforesaid plantation which rents partly for grain & partly for cash for all \$860 per year two negroes two or three ^{men} ^{three} women & four children

The three ^{men} worth 70 dollars each -
Each per year -

One of the women worth \$30 and one \$20 per year -

The yearly amt of the profits may be estimated at the other negro woman too old & the children too small to hire for any thing - to one third of this sum of \$420 the widow

would be entitled - viz -

which being divided from the whole amt \$280 for all four of the words viz \$70 to each word per year no settlement has yet been made with

the administrator the Guardian believing a considerable part of the personal Estate has been sold & the proceeds applied to the payment of debts but there probably remains in his hands at this time subject however to the further payment of debts if any abt \$400 to which said heirs would be entitled the yearly interest on which if in hand would be \$24 - or \$6 for each ward -

Then the Guardian finding that the yearly

of the Estate could not be estimated at more than \$76 to each ward and probably not so much if a division of the estate were made has heretofore agreed with the widow then mother who is the administrator that she should keep the estate together received all proceeds of it and in consideration thereof she binds & clothes the four wards and schools the two youngest in a far more advantageous & genteel manner than could be done if the Estate several wards respectively

Some of the ^{proceeds} ^{applied} ^{to the} ^{care of the} ^{wards} ^{respectively}
The widow also maintains & clothes the useful negroes pay the taxes of every kind on the estate and all the accidental expenses attending a genteel support of the wards the Education of the two youngest & the management of the estate -

There is also a tract of 800 acres of unimproved land in Washington county an undivided half of which belong to Joseph Thompson one of the wards but which produces nothing in the hands of the Guardian - All which is respectfully submitted to the court - 7 October 1816

I James Harlan of Mercer weak of body
But of sound mind and memory do hereby
Make this my last will and testament rev-
oking all others — Principally and first
Give my Soul to Almighty God who gave
it me and my Body to the earth to be buried
in a decent manner at the discretion of my
exors as my estate I devise in the following manner
I first direct direct that my Just debts and
funeral expenses be paid I then give and bequeath
to my dearly and beloved wife Sarah Harlan
during her life 178 acres of land including
including the mansion House and disignate
on the connected plat by its number 4. Also
the following Negroes (cons) Betty and all her
children Fanny and her ^{youngst} children Bucken
and Virgin all my Household and Kitchen
furniture together with six horses 10 cows
five steers 30 sheep and 40 Hogs to be hereof
of my stock and the one third of the money
that may be due to me from the executors
of the late George Colwell Dead the slaves and

Personal estate divided to her disposal by will
or other wise and at any time —

2nd I give and bequeath to my daughter Beattell Harlan
and three thousand dollars to be paid to her with
interest when she marries or at the age of twenty
one years the interest to commence and year of the
sale of my personal Estate —

3rd I give and bequeath to my son in law William Harlan
and all that part of tract of land in Christian
County on which he resides that was paid for by
me also Thirteen Hundred and ninety ^{one} dollars

Being the amount of my account against
him for two negroes a mare leather cash 40
paid at sundry times also \$70 in the hands
of Mathew Harlan \$18 in the hands of George
Harlan \$150 in the paid by me to William
Harlan for Mathew Harlan & \$150 in cash

4th I give and bequeath to my son George Harlan
seven hundred and thirty four dollars and
sixty one cents being the amount of my account
against him and five hundred dollars —

It is my will and that my lands be distributed
amongst my seven sons agreeable to a Plat
and explication signed by me and dated this day
To wit Silas George Eligan Sime John James
and Davis each agreeable to his number and
at the price therein stated so as to make each
equal ~~there~~ whose lots amount to more than
the average price to pay to those whose lots
amounts to less but it is to be observed
that the lots designated to my son
