To William Shortridge six acres bounded as follows beginning at a large Sugar tree on the road from John Shortridge's original line running thence North 81 deg East 119 poles to a Sugar tree blackberry and ash thence North 30 deg West 100 poles to an ash and Sugar tree thence South 81 deg West 107 poles to three Sugar trees near a small Spring thence South Twelve deg East one hundred and twenty one poles to a rock thence South 81 deg East twenty two poles to the Beginning

In testimony to the order of the honorable the County Court of
 Montgomery to us the undersigned three of the Commissioners
 named in said order then and this 28th day of December
 1821 at the house of James Hopwood and after being put
 duly sworn had proceeded to make the following settlement
 and division viz We find the Estate in debtors and cash
 to be worth three thousand three hundred and thirty seven dollars
 and after dividing the Negroes into four lots each having
 drawn for choice do allot to Peyton Whitlock lot 1 containing
 fifty and his 3 children Alfred and Lewis and a balance
 in cash to be paid by the Guardian James Hopwood that sum
 of one hundred and twenty two dollars 51 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents which
 when paid will be in full of his share the Negroes being
 now returned also allot to Martin Whitlock lot 2 containing
 Negroes Henton and Sarah amounting to eight hundred
 dollars and a balance in his favor of one hundred
 and one dollars and thirty cents to be paid to him by the Guardian
 James Hopwood which when paid will be in full of his
 share and Martin Whitlock not being present have left his
 share in the hands of the Guardian James Hopwood the
 remaining lot 3 and 4 in each said Negroes are also
 left in the hands of James Hopwood for the further
 order of your honorable body the amount of the
 said being all bills up to this date together with

an allowance to said Guardian for his services of fifty dollars (204)
 all which is here with submitted to Court who under an
 order and seals the day and date just above written
