

In the name of God Amen I James Ryland of the County of
London being in perfect health and memory but calling to mind
the uncertainty of this life and that it is appointed for all men
once to die do make this my last will and testament.

Supplicating I commit my soul into the hands of God that
gave it and my body to the dust from whence it came in hopes
of a joyful resurrection when the trumpet of God shall come
in and through the atoning merit of the great and glorious
redeemer Jesus Christ on whose righteousness I depend for the Just-
ification before the great and merciful Judge of quick and
dead and as to worldly affairs which God in his abundant goodness
has bestowed on me I dispose of in the
following manner I give to my son Townsend Dykton
all the lands I hold in the County of London saving
and reserving to Ann Ryland the use of the plantation where
now I now live and under fence for farming during her
natural life I also give to the said T^D Ryland Negroes
Joe Charles David Joshua Jude and Eliza with their children
not to be otherwise disposed of to him and his heirs and assigns forever
Also all my share in the turnpike Road and two further bedchambers
furniture. I give to my daughter Elizabeth Hale Negroes Leora
and her issue to her and her heirs and assigns forever I give to my
Daughter Letitia Luckholl Negroes Lavina and Jane to her and her
heirs and assigns forever I give to my daughter Ann Ryland Negroes
Cato Daniel Wind Billy Simon Vilett Lett and Mariads my
house and kitchen furniture not otherwise disposed of by this my
last will and Testament to her and her heirs and assigns forever

I also give to my said daughter Ann Ryland the use of the planta-
tion on which I now live to include all the lands I may have indeed
under fence on the west side of the road leading from my Mill
to Midsbury during her natural life

I give to my grand daughter Mary & Mary Ann Ryland and
Alma a small horse called Pantaloon two cows and calves to her and her
heirs and assigns forever also one feather bed and furniture. My will and desire is
that all lands in the State of Kentucky on the water of Licking Creek
contained in ^{my} survey of one thousand acres to be equally divided
equally and equally between my son Townsend Dykton My Son in law
William Hale and Leora Luckholl to them and their heirs and assigns forever
And that one other Tract in the said State on the water of the
said Tract contained in one survey of one thousand acres to be equally divided between
my grand son in law John Murphy and my son in law William Hale as
follows to wit to John Murphy one moiety of said Tract to be laid off on the
side lying on the upper part of the said creek and along the line of said
one thousand acres formerly granted to Andrew Moore the other moiety to the
said William Hale to them and their heirs and assigns forever. And that
that all the stock of every description and plantation I own not otherwise
disposed of by this my last will and Testament be equally divided between
Townsend Dykton and Ann Ryland to them and their heirs and assigns
forever. I confirm and appoint Leora Luckholl and Townsend Dykton
Executors of this my last will and Testament. In Witness whereof I have

and in the 42nd year of the Commonwealth

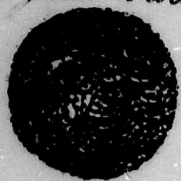
