James In the name of God amen
I James Trimble of Montgomery County and
State of Kentucky being in a bad state of health
but of sound memory do appoint this instrument of
writing to be my last will and testament. First I
commit my soul to God who gave it, my body to the
dust from whence it ~~came~~ was taken in hopes to
participate a glorious resurrection through the
merits and intercession of Christ Jesus our Lord.

As to my worldly Goods which it has pleased
God to bless me with and which I am now in possession
of I will and bequeath in the following manner

~~I will and bequeath to my son David Trimble a sum of five hundred dollars
to be paid to him when he comes of age of his relation to me
and to his wife some small sum of money of any of my heirs~~
My Will and Bequest to my son John Trimble

Seventy acres of land whereon I now live to be his right
at my decease together with all my farming tools

My Will and Bequest to my daughter Betsey Trimble
one Chesnut Barrell Albare and one Chesnut Barrell
hatt one year old two haws the Balance of the
hatt to be divided between her and John Trimble

Except one bar which they are to give Robert Trimble
out of the stock. I likewise Bequeath to Betsey and
John Trimble all my Sheep and hogs to dispose of
them as they think proper I likewise Will and Bequeath
to my daughter Betsey Trimble one Bed and Bedding with
other clothing which she chooses to keep she is also to have
all the privileges of living in the house as usual as long
as she chooses to continue to stay together with her
Maintenance off the Land where she continues to stay.

My daughter Nancy Young Sally Johnston James
Northcut Thomas Trimble Hugh Trimble I bequeath
off with one Dollar each

My son John Trimble is to see that all my last
debts are discharged and to collect any that may be
owing he is also to keep his own Man as work.

and Hugh Trimble is to have my Man as work
and John the Coll. My last Will to my
grand son James B. Trimble. In witness whereof
I set my hand and seal this 26th June 1815
