 and thirtieth at camp at the foot of the Medicine Rocks
 hide Thomas Oakley a private in Captain Pugh's company
 when in a severe indisposition of body but of good mind and
 memory that had no hopes of recovering from his present
 sickness and he wished his property disposed of in the
 following manner to wit: a note he held against James
