Kentucky being weak of body but of perfect mind
and memory Thanks be to God for the same do make
and establish this instrument of writing as an & for
my last will and testament (twice) first I give my body
to the dust from whence it came hoping for a happy resurrection
through the merit of Jesus Christ. In the first place after
all my just debts and funeral expences are paid twice
and dispose of such worldly goods as it hath pleased the
God to bless me with in the following manner to wit
After my decease I will that my executor to be herein
after named sell at publick sale giving a credit of
twelve months all my estate both real and personal
of every kind and sort whatever (except such specific beque
as shall be herein after mentioned) and collect all
such debts as may and or to become due in any manner
or way whatever and appropriate the same as he or she
directed and do further authorize my said Executor to do herein
after named to convey by deed or deed the houses and lots I
own in Mount Sterling to the purchaser or purchasers in the
same way and manner as should be agreed when sold as
before mentioned. I give to my son Oliver J. Brown two hundred
and thirty seven dollars which is in addition to what I have
before given make the sum of three hundred dollars to be
paid him by Executor when the money the money from the
sale before mentioned and a new money is already due and to
become due an interest. I will and bequeath to my nephew

George Brown a Black horse colt with a star in his ^{left}
forehead which I now own the said horse and harness
generally called his which he is to receive of my executor
at my decease and also fifty dollars in cash when the money
arising from the sale of my estate and the money now
coming to it shall be collected. I will and bequeath to
my daughter Polly Fisher wife of John B. Fisher the
sum of thirty dollars to be paid to her by Executor when
the money is collected as aforesaid. I do hereby will and
bequeath to my grand children to wit, James William
Samuel Jefferson John Baptiste Julian Emory & Orlando
John children of said John B. Fisher all the balance of
my money arising from the sale of my estate or to be
collected to be equally divided amongst them and to be paid
to them severally as follows to wit to the girls as they arrive
at the age of 17 or 18 years or if they choose or wish to lay
their part out in education they are at liberty to draw
my executor for the amount to be appropriated to that purpose
The boys to be paid their several parts at the age of twenty
years without any or all of them should wish the amount
for the purpose of schooling in which case the amount can
at any time be drawn from my executor to defray any of
the said expences incurred in that way. If either of the said
children should die before he or they shall get their pro
tion the whole or balance due there is to be divided ^{between}
the survivors of he she or them it is my will that the
money as it be collected by my Executor be placed upon interest
and at each division or part being paid off the principle
the principle and interest at that time to be equally divided
Lastly I constitute and appoint my friend William J. Barnes
of this my last will and testament and from me

by my confidence in his honesty and integrity
deputed him to qualify as such without the trust
requiring of him any security hereby revoking all
and every former will or wills by me heretofore made
declaring this as and for my last will and testament

In the name of God Amen I Thomas Beatty of Montgomery
County and State of Kentucky being weak in Body
but of perfect sound mind and memory, do hereby
testify for the same, as therefore must and
Publish my last will and testament in the manner
and form following (viz) firstly I give and bequeath
unto my Beloved Daughter Polly Beatty a Part of
my land on which I live to contain sixty acres bounded
as follows (land) Beginning at a Black walnut tree
and then come to Saml Beatty thence running

East to the first crop fence thence running
northward to the line of my survey to and to include
I measure just sixty acres which I allow my
Daughter Polly to have, on condition of her
will and truly paying unto my beloved Daughter
Polly Beatty one hundred Dollars in money
Eighteen Months after my decease Secondly
I give and Bequeath unto my Beloved son Thomas
William Beatty all the Balance of land after
Polly gets her sixty acres the Balance to be equally
and truly divided according to quantity and
quality between my sons Thomas and William
on condition they pay unto my Beloved
Daughter Nancy Beatty one hundred Dollars
which they Thomas & William are jointly to pay
each a moiety of that sum eighteen Months after
my decease And also further give and Bequeath
unto my Beloved son Joseph and James Beatty one
of my Estate the sum of ten Dollars each, which
I allow for my son Thomas and William to pay
them in consequence of the land I gave them and
I further give unto my son William my largest Gray
mare, and all my hogs which are to be applied to
the use of the family for their supports And also give
unto my Beloved Daughter Sally Beatty one Bay horse
and also one Bed and furniture and also one cow
And also give unto my Beloved Daughter Nancy Beatty
my Waggon and hind bear my best Gray mare and
my Bald filly and also one of my Red cows and also
four of my Sheep Swine, and one Brown mare And
further my son in law Joseph Beatty is to continue in
possession where he lives now and the ground heathen
lands together with the big Spring field for the term
of three years after my decease and then to be given up
to the before mentioned persons -
