"The said William Case then told the Deposition and Mrs Davis that he wished his wife Polly Case to have his mare and a bridle and her side saddle, and one chair because of her "chills and that he wished the other two chairs to remain for his two Children. - That the said William Case remained sick, and kept his bed from that time until he died. The above took place about three months ago at William Case our house. The person the Estate of William Case is with now shall take the person the Estate of William Case to the same facts."

It is therefore considered by the court that the same be established as the noncompeting Will of William Case Deceased.
