I Frederick Sever of the county of Muhlenberg and state of Kentucky being weak in body but of perfect mind and memory do make and ordain this my last will and Testament as follows To wit First I allow all my Just Debts and burial expences be paid and Executors satisfied I give and bequeath to my wife Caterina my Dwelling house with fifteen acres of Land round it her life time and her lawful part of all other property and the rest to my children as follows to my Daughter Susannah and my son John and my Daughter Elizabeth and my son Solomon and Joseph and my Daughter Emlyanna all thereabove mentioned to have an Equal proportion when the state is divided and my son Michael and Gabriel I give half as much as one of the above mentioned heirs and my son Jacob I give One Shilling and Six pence and I constitute and ordain Solomon Rhoades and Jesse Jackson to be Executors of this my last will and Testament Disannulling all Wills and Testaments by me made prior to these presents. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and fixed my seal this Twenty Eighth day of Feby One Thousand Eight hundred and four.

The twenty sixth day of March 1803 I John Smith of the County of Muhlenberg and State of Kentucky Planter being very sick and weak in body but of perfect mind memory thanks to God therefor Calling to mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die I do make and ordain this my last will and Testament that is to say principally and first of all I give and Recommend my soul to God that give it and my body I recommend to the earth to be Buried at the Direction of my Executors nothing Doubting but at the general resurrection I shall receive the same again by the Mighty power of God and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it has pleased God to Bless me on this ways I give and dispose of the same in the following manner and form. First I do give to my well beloved wife Mary I gave her living on the plantation that I now live on during her life. I also give her a negro Called Melly and one called Batt.
