## Susanna Cooly's Will.

In the name of God Amen. I Susanna Cooly of Muhlenberg county and state of Kentucky being at present weak in body yet of perfect memory and presence of mind, thanks be given unto God, calling to mind the mortality of the body and knowing that it is appointed for all women kind once to die, I do make and ordain this my last will and testament that is to say principally and first of all I give and recommend my soul into the hands of Almighty God that gave it and my body to the earth to be buried in Christian burial at the discretion of my executors, nothing doubting but at the general resurrection I shall receive the

same again by the mighty power of God, and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it has pleased God to bless me in this life I give and devise and dispose of the same in the following manner and form. (Viz)

First I give and bequeath to my loving son Job Mathias fifty acres of land of my place twenty acres of land on the east side adjoining Samuel Drake and thirty acres on the north line adjoining Gilbert Evans and the balance of my land I give and bequeath to my daughter Susanna Reeves during her lifetime and after her death to her daughter Susanna Reeves if she outlives her mother and if not to her next surviving female heir of her children. Secondly. I ordain that my horses shall be sold and the money arising from the sale to be put out to interest for the benefit of my granddaughter Susanna Reeves and my grandson Justus Mathews and to be equally divided between them. I bequeath to my loving son Job Mathews one pair of gears (2<sup>nd</sup>) One leather collar, one pair of harness, one pair of iron traces, also one mattock and a sprouting hoe and one bed spread & one black broad cloth coat I bequeath to my son in law Samuel Reeves one black broadcloth great coat and all the remainder of my effects I leave give and bequeath to my daughter Susanna Reeves to make use of as she thinks proper, and I do hereby utterly disallow and disannul all and every other former wills

October 4<sup>th</sup> 1808 began to charge 2<sup>nd</sup> mo

testaments, legacies and bequeathments and I do ordain John McFarland and Samuel Reaves to be my sole executors of this my last will and testament in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this day 180 Signed, Sealed, published, pronounced and declared by the said Susanna Coley as her last will and testament in the presence of us who in the presence of her and in the presence of each other have hereunto subscribed our names this 25th of October in the year 1807.

named Monday, one horse. I, Charles, give  
and bequeath to my daughter, Susan  
one negro girl named Tammer and one  
feather bed. I, Charles, do give and bequeath  
to my son, John Lewis, one negro boy by  
the name of Dick and one horse. I, Charles,  
do give and bequeath to my daugh,  
Rebecca, one negro boy, Dave. I, Charles,  
do give and bequeath to my daughter  
Lizer one negro boy named Simon. I,  
Charles, do give and bequeath to my son,  
Charles Lewis, one negro girl named Jude.  
I, Charles, do desire to give to my three  
youngest children, Elizabeth Lewis, William  
Lewis, and Mary Lewis, one negro piece  
provided the old wench shall bear as  
many. If not this increase I desire  
the said three children to be made up  
as much as will make them equal  
with the others above mentioned at the  
death of my wife. I, Charles, do give and  
bequeath to my wife, Elizabeth Lewis, her  
life three negroes, Peter, Trager, and Grace  
with all my lands, stock and household  
furniture, then the balance after make  
the three children above mentioned  
equal with the rest the balance to be  
equal divided amongst the hole at the

death of my wife, Elizabeth Lewis, I, Charles Lewis, do beg and desire that my wife, Elizabeth Lewis, James Lewis, and Isaac Pennington shall stand as guardians, this being my last will and testament. Signed, sealed in the presents of us. Nov. 1, 1806.
