 sound and perfect memory doth give and bequeath my personal and
 real estate as follows I give to my beloved wife Sarah Legman the
 one third part of my home plantation during her life also the balance
 I give and bequeath to my daughter Betty Spotswood the one
 half of the old field and that on the backside during her widowhood
 I give and bequeath to my son William Legman the land
 which he formerly cultivated to him and his heirs forever I give
 to my daughter Marthy Legman my son "muel Legman and
 James Legman the balance of my plantation to be equally divided
 with the three above named after my wife's death and also the one half
 of the stock of cows and sheep and hogs to the above named three in
 case my daughter Marthy should marry that my son James and
 James shall be bound to pay unto her the one third part of the val-
 uation of the land in three annual payments and that in good
 trade I give my son in law Thomas Smith five pound in trade
 also to William Gallaway five pound in trade the money that is
 coming from my son John Legman and the balance after my debts is
 paid that James and James shall have two thirds of the money
 left and my wife Sarah and Marthy the other third then I give
 and bequeath unto my son John Legman and David Legman
 the plantation which David Legman now lives on to be equally
 divided between the two above named sons my son John Legman
 and James Legman I have Executors to my will thus being my
 last Will and Testament Wharof I have set my hand and
 seal this 8th day of April one Thousand eight hundred and forty
 four
