In the name of God Amen I Samuel Brown of the County of Nelson and State of Kentucky being sick and weak of body do make this my last will and testament in the manner and form following, my Request is that all my just debts be first paid, I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Maria all those the Durbury house wherein I live for & during her natural life, my son Nathaniel Brown is to furnish my wife with a full and comfortable maintenance as long as she lives, from the produce of my farm, and my son Nathaniel is also to furnish and maintain my three daughters namely Nancy, Mary and Abigail, so long as they remain on my farm, in the family, in the same manner as he is to accommodate his wife, there is already set apart for my before mentioned three daughters a house land and saddle a bed and furniture for each of them which they are to have together with their wearing apparel, and my son Nathaniel is to pay to each of my Daughters before mentioned when they see cause to go away from the family, twenty five pounds in trade to each, I give and bequeath to my wife one black mare called the Durbury light all the rest of my horse creatures, and before mentioned together with every piece of stock that I now possess
