This Inventory and appraisement of the estate of James Hagan deceased was returned and ordered to be recorded. Teste, Ben Grayson C.C.

In obedience to an order of the Worshipful court of Nelson county with the commissioners appointed by said court to appraise to Susannah May the widow of Gabriel May dec^d her right of dower in the lands of which the s^d Gabriel dec^d seized and possessed have allotted to the s^d widow one hundred and eighty nine acres and three fourths of land including the manor house. Beginning at 2 beeches on the Southbank of Salt river thence S 13 1/2 poles to a beech, Walnut and Elm on the line between Caleb Hardisty and the lands of the s^d decedent thence with said line S 47 East 123 poles to a beech thence S 45 East 170 poles to a stake in another of the original lines thence S 19 W. 80 poles to Asher creek thence down the same with the meanders thereof to the mouth thence down Salt river with the meanders to the beginning the s^d widow having previously directed us to certify the court

that she then paid all claims to the balance of the land of which her husband dec^d seized and possessed given under our hand this 27th day of Sept^r 1814.

At a County court held for Nelson county on Tuesday the 22nd day of November 1814

The above allotment and appraisement of Susannah May's dower was returned and ordered to be recorded. Teste, Ben Grayson C.C.

In obedience to an order of the County court of Nelson county appointing us the undersigned to appraise and allot to Susannah Green her dower in the lands, Slaves and personal estate of Benjamin Green deceased we being first sworn before Ignatius Hagan Justice of the peace for Nelson county. We did on the first day of December in the year 1814 proceed to comply with the said order of court by allotting unto the said Susannah Green her proportionable part of the said Slaves, To wit, George at five hundred dollars, Pelly at three hundred dollars, Charles at eighty dollars, and Anthony at three hundred, eleven dollars sixty six and two thirds cents amounting in the whole to eleven hundred ninety six dollars sixty six and two thirds cents, being one dollar eleven and one third cents over and above for the said Susannah Green proportionable part of said Slaves. The Slaves were valued as follows, To wit, George at \$500. James 500. Anthony 316. 66 2/3. Pelly 300. Ann 350. Rachael 250. Hannah 333. 33 1/3. Eleazah 233. 33 1/3. John 233. 33 1/3. Louis 200. Harry 150. Charles 80. Jane 140. \$3586. 66 2/3 whole amount of the valuation of the Slaves one third part 1195. 55 1/3 this sum was allotted to M^{rs} Green as above. We your Commissioners then proceeded to survey s^d tract of land and lay off and allot to M^{rs} Susannah Green relict of Benjamin Green deceased her one third part of said tract after running around the said survey we find that it contains two hundred and fifty two acres & is designated by the letters A. B. C. D. E. F. G. H. as laid down (see the plat) and bounded as follows Beginning at Samuel McElitts North east corner two birches and white oak and running

thence East one hundred and seventy poles to two ash trees and an Elm thence North one hundred and seventy six poles to a hickory corner of the land of the said Benjamin Green. Bought of William Boorman same course continued north seventy six poles to two white Oaks and a Black oak on the east side of a branch thence West eighty three poles to a stone thence South thirteen degrees west forty five and half poles to a stone thence North eighty degrees West sixty poles to a poplar thence South twelve degrees East thirty seven poles to two poplar stumps thence West six and three poles to a white oak and stake at the corner of Richard Pices meadow one of the original corners thence South twelve degrees East one hundred and eighty poles to the beginning these lines include the land Benjamin Green purchased of William Boorman and the land the said Green purchased of Joseph Hag in being fifty acres & half the tract of Boormans contains two hundred and two acres making in the whole survey the said two hundred and fifty two & half acres. The lot represented by the letters W. X. Y. Z was laid off by the direction of the executor and executrix and contains twenty two acres two rods and fourteen poles. The lot designated by the letters M. A. N. S. 5 contains twenty eight acres and one half and was laid off for George. A. Green by the direction of the executor. The lot laid off for M^{rs} Susannah Green is represented by the figures 1. 2. 3. 4. 5. 6 and contains one third part of the whole of the said survey after deducting twenty eight and half acres for George. A. Green who owns that quantity out of the whole of said tract which was got of William Boorman. M^{rs} Greens part being seventy four and half acres and is bounded as follows, look at the plat Beginning at figure 1 a stone planted by the south side of the road near the gate and about forty steps from the house thence with the road South eighty six degrees west thirty nine poles and fourteen links to another stone on the side of the said road thence South four degrees East ninety two poles to a hickory white oak and sugar tree on the west side of a spring branch thence East one hundred and three poles to three white oaks and an ash in the original line and by the side of the road thence North one hundred and twenty two poles to a hickory and red oak on the North side of a branch thence West sixty eight poles to a stake in the orchard thence South twenty five poles to the beginning. For a further illustration of the said survey we your commissioners will be more explicit, the twenty eight acres and half was one fourth part of two thirds of the land William Boorman had deeded to him from Samuel C. Pottinger, the twenty two acres two rods and fourteen poles was sold to

Benjⁿ Green by the said William Boorman two thirds of the balance of the said survey was devised by the said Benjamin to four of his relations George. A. Green claims one fourth of the two thirds who purchased the same of Henry Miller who bought of one of the legacies. These whole of these lines were run by the natives & lately the surveyor employed by the Executor and if there are any mistakes in the lines & your Commissioners are not blamable

the original survey being returned to them from which they make this report. Given under our hands this 17th day of Dec^r 1814.

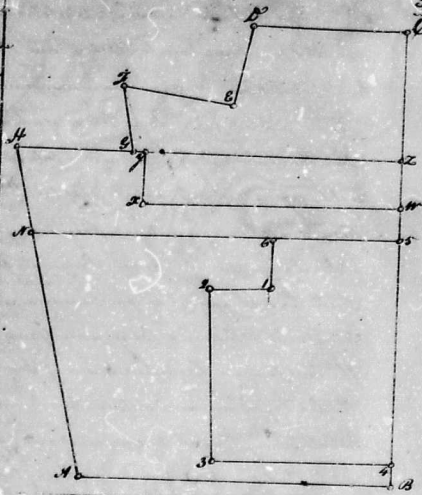
