do make and publish, this writing, as my last will and testament  
in manner and form following: To wit.

Item, I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Giffporah, all her  
marriage apparel, her Bedstead, Bed, and bedding, one cow such  
as she may choose, her spinning wheel, my loom, as also all my  
house hold and kitchen furniture (except such articles as I have  
given unto my daughter Giffporah herein after mentioned, and also  
such articles which I have given unto the children of my son David  
Foster and his wife Priscilla herein after named).

Item, I give and bequeath unto my daughter Margaret Kincaid,  
the sum of five dollars to be paid by my Executors herein after named.

Item, I give and bequeath unto the children of my son David  
Foster and Priscilla his wife, to wit: Samuel M. Foster, James L. Foster,  
Abelberry M. Foster, David A. Foster, and to such other children  
as my said son David, and Priscilla his wife may here after  
have, one hundred Twelve and one half acres of land,  
on which my son David and myself now lives, being  
the West end of my tract of land, which is bounded on the  
East by a line run by John Manser when dividing my tract  
of land; My mares and heeds, all my farming utensils

of every kind, all my horned cattle (except two cows, one of which  
I have given to my wife Giffporah, and the other to my daughter Giffporah)  
all my stock of hogs, all also all the house hold and kitchen furniture  
which I have, to my said son David Foster and Priscilla his wife,  
and which are in their possession at this time; and it is my will  
and desire that my said son David Foster and Priscilla his wife  
may keep the possession of and enjoy all the profits of the said tract  
of land now devised, to their children as well as apple a  
Manner as the they held it in their own right, during their natu-  
ral lives; and at their death to be divided between their  
children. And it is also my will, that for and in consideration  
of the possession and enjoyment of the profits arising from the said  
tract of land and plantation therein unto my said son David and

ly Caled her Beds and bedding, my Desk, my Black mare  
Caled Star, my cow Caled Reg, my lot of ground lying in the  
Town of Barbours known by its number (Sixty) on the plat or  
plan of said town, It is my will that she may have six of  
my sheep, such as she may choose, and it is my will and desire  
that my Executors pay over to my said daughter Giffporah, all the  
Money that is owing to me by the heirs of Jacob Ham Decd. and  
also all the money that is coming and owing to me by John Ham for  
the land I bought of said Jacob Decd. which land was lost.
