

In the name of God, Amen! I, Charlotte Barnett, being of sound mind and disposing memory, but advanced in years, and conscious of the precarious and uncertain tenure by which human life is held, and admonished by the ravages of death among my family and friends that it is my duty to hold myself in every way ready for its approach, do hereby make, ordain, publish and declare this my last will and Testament, to wit: Item 1st, I bequeath my body to the earth whence it came, and my soul to God who gave it. Item 2d, I will and desire that my personal property be equally divided between my children, and in the event of the death of any of my children before this will is carried into effect, then the surviving children of such child shall have the share of their deceased parent. Item 3d, I give and devise to my daughter Eliza and her husband, Stephen A. Bennett, the farm on which I now live, being the same deeded to me by W. P. Briant, and containing 150 acres. To have and to hold to themselves, their heirs and assigns forever, together with all and singular the appurtenances therunto belonging, provided they live with and maintain me in a manner suitable to my station and degree for the remainder of my natural life, subject moreover to the herein after devise to my son Joseph W. Barnett. Item 4th, I give and devise to my son Joseph W. Barnett a one-half interest in the coal on the land above devised to Eliza and S. A. Bennett, to do with as he may see proper; but if he should ever wish to sell it, then I desire him to give the said Stephen A. Bennett the refusal thereof. Item 5th, I hereby charge the payment of my debt and funeral expenses upon my personal property, but do not wish any more of my personally sold than may be absolutely necessary for the payment of my debts, but I desire that my children or their representatives shall fairly, equally, and with feelings of fraternal kindness and regard, divide the same among themselves. I hereby nominate and appoint my worthy friend, Robt. E. Barnett Executor of this my will, and request that the Court of Probate permit him to take upon himself the discharge of this my last trust, without security. In the name of God, Amen. I, Archibald P. Montague of the town of Cornwell and County of Ohio and State of Kentucky, being of sound and disposing memory and mind, and being desirous of settling my worldly affairs while I have strength and capacity so to do, do make and publish this my last will and Testament, that is to say: First, I direct that my burial expenses and all of my just debts be paid immediately after my death and burial. Second, I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Nancy E. Montague the house and lot in the town of Cornwell on which I now reside, together with all the household and kitchen furniture, also all of the live stock, buggy and wagon for her use and benefit during her natural life, and at her death to revert to my heirs. In addition I direct that my wife receive out of my estate Five Hundred Dollars in money. Third, The balance of my estate I direct to be equally divided between my six children, Charlie E. Montague, Etta Montague, Joseph S. Montague, Archibald A. Montague, Edwin A. Montague, and Willie E. Montague. Fourth, I direct that my son Charlie E. Montague take charge of my estate and proceed to close out all of the goods now on hand and discontinue the business so far as the estate is concerned. Fourth, Whereas George W. Paylor being indebted to me in the sum of money secured by a mortgage on his farm, I direct that my executors do not proceed to collect the same under two years from the maturity of said mortgage, provided said George W. Paylor pays the interest on said debt at the end of each year. Fifth, It is my wish that my executors do not urge the collection of safe investments. And lastly, I hereby appoint my wife Nancy E. Montague and Charlie E. Montague my sole Executors, not requiring any bond of them as such. I witness whereof I have hereunto subscribed name, this the 2d day of April, 1881.

Platt and bounded with A. Woodward's lands:

Lot No. 1, 244 acres: Beginning at a stone corner to J. M. Woodward in the Leathorn Road, thence with J. M.'s line S. 16° W. 54 poles to a stone, thence S. 89° E. 8 poles, 14 links to a stone on a line as was established in the Deeds from Pope to said Woodward, thence S. 10° W. 161 poles to a hickory and two sweet gums, thence S. 80° W. 135 poles to two water oaks, gum and hickory, thence N. 75° E. 20 poles to a sweet gum on the Leathorn Road, thence with said road as it meanders now and with the middle thereof to the beginning.
