In the name of God, Amen. I, Harrison Fleener of the County of Ohio and State of Kentucky, being of sound mind and memory, and considering the uncertainty of this frail and transitory life, do therefore make, ordain, publish, and declare this to be my last will and testament, that is to say: First, after all my lawful debts are paid and discharged, the residue of my estate real and personal I give, bequeath, and dispose of as follows, to-wit: to my beloved wife all the household and kitchen furniture, two horses, two cows and calves, five head of sheep, one year's provision, also a lien on lot No. 1 and lot No. 2, for her maintenance during her natural life, which lots will be hereinafter described. To my son John W., lot No. 1, being a part of the farm on which I now live, lying in Ohio County Kentucky, near Green River, and bounded as follows: Beginning at a sweet gum, corner to the original survey near a branch, thence N. 65° E. 66 poles to three beeches, thence S. 62° E. 7 poles to a beech, thence N. 56° E. 57 1/2 poles to a beech, thence N. 14° E. 15 poles to a black oak and white oak, corner to the Joe James farm, thence N. 75° W. 44 1/4 poles to a 2 dead mulberry, thence N. 16 1/2 E. 24 3/4 poles to a stone in the Joe James line on a drain above the spring, thence down said drain N. 68° W. 37 3/4 poles to a eye amove on said branch, thence S. 65° W. 22 3/4 poles to the center of the Wilson Perry road, thence with same S. 42 1/2 E. 17 poles to 2 small walnuts at the corner of the garden and corner to Wm. Fleener's lot, thence with his line S. 85° W. 28 poles to a stone at the corner of George Fleener's garden, a corner to lot No. 4, thence with a line of same S. 2 1/2 W. 16 poles to a stone, thence S. 77° W. 3 1/5 to a stone, S. 7° W. 17 poles to a stone, thence N. 80° E. leaving the line of lot No. 4, 8 poles to a stone on a small drain, thence down same with its meanders S. 13° W. 10 poles, S. 20° E. 18 poles, S. 24° W. 26 poles, S. 10° W. 11 3/4 poles to the beginning, containing 51 acres, 1 rod and 20 poles. To my grandson James A. Hodges lot No. 2, bounded as follows: Beginning at a sweet gum, corner lot No. 1, and corner to the original survey, thence S. 26° W. 47 poles to 2 beeches, ~~on the North bank of Green River~~, thence with same S. 52° W. 95 poles to two beeches on the North bank of Green River, thence down the river N. 72° W. 52 poles to 2 small maples on the

bank of same, thence S. 56° E. leaving the river, 61 poles to a maple, corner to lot No. 3, thence N. 35° W. 10 poles to a stone, also a corner to No. 3, thence S. 56° E. 94 poles to a walnut and water beech, corner to No. 4, on a slough, thence with the same N. 11 poles, thence N. 36° E. 1 1/2 poles to 2 small gums, also a corner lot No. 4, thence N. 35° E. 36 poles and 14 links to a stone, another corner to lot No. 4, thence N. 80° E. 19 poles and 16 links to a stone, near the tobacco barn, a corner to lot No. 1, thence with line of same down a drain with its meanders S. 13° W. 10 poles, thence S. 20° E. 18 poles, S. 24° W. 26 poles, S. 10° W. 11 3/4 poles to the beginning, containing 49 acres, 38 poles.

To my son William M. lot No. 3: Beginning at a history stump and stone near it, corner to lot No. 4, and in the line of No. 2, thence with a line of No. 4 N. 35° W. 40 1/5 poles to a stone in the line of No. 6, thence S. 52° W. 116 poles to a small maple on the bank of the river, corner to lot No. 5, thence up the same with its meanders S. 26° E. 56 1/2 poles to an ash and poplar, thence S. 47° E. 57 1/2 poles to 2 maples on the river, thence, leaving the river, S. 56° E. 61 poles to a maple, corner to lot No. 2, thence N. 35° W. 10 poles, also corner to lot No. 2, thence with a line of same S. 56° E. 61 poles to the beginning, containing 70 acres and 20 poles.

To my son George D., lot No. 4: Beginning at a stone, corner to lot No. 3 in the line of lot No. 6, thence N. 52° E. 12 poles to a stone, corner to lot No. 6, thence N. 32° W. 25 poles, corner to No. 6, thence N. 51 1/2 E. 54 poles to a stone and 2 large beeches marked as pointers, another corner to lot No. 6 and in the original line, thence with said line S. 51° E. 22 poles to a black gum, sweet gum, and elm, thence S. 23 1/2 W. 44 3/4 poles to 2 sweet gums and beech, Mitchell's corner, thence N. 88 1/2 E. 30 poles, N. 81 E. 42 poles, thence N. 63 1/2 E. 11 poles, thence S. 85° E. 3 1/5 poles to a stone, corner to lot No. 1 and also a corner to Wm. M. Fleener's lot, thence with a line of No. 1 S. 2 1/2 W. 16 poles to a stone, thence S. 77° W. 3 1/5 poles to a stone, thence S. 7° W. 17 poles to a stone, corner to lot No. 1 and in the line of No. 2, N. 80° W. 14 poles and 16 links to a stone, also a corner to No. 2, thence with a line of same S. 35° W. 36 poles and 14 links to two small sweet gums on a slough, also a corner to lot No. 2, thence S. 36° W. 12 poles to a walnut and water beech on said slough, corner to No. 2, thence N. 56° W. 32 poles and 10 links to a stone, corner to lot No. 3 in the line of No. 2, thence with a line of No. 3 N. 35° W. 40 1/5 poles to the beginning, containing 48 acres and 3/4 and 5 poles.

To my daughter, Annaline Beach, wife of James Henry Beach, lot No. 5: Beginning at a stone, corner to lot No. 3, thence S. 15° W. 107 poles to hickory and elm, corner to lot No. 7, and in

the line of lot No. 6, thence S. 49° W. 72 poles to a beech and sugar tree, corner to the old Samuel James survey, also a corner to lot No. 7 on the North bank of the river, thence up the river bounding thereon S. 22° E. 115 poles to a small maple on the bank of the same, corner to lot No. 3, thence with the line of same N. 52° E. 100 poles to the beginning, containing 54 acres, 3 rods and 14 poles. To my daughter Rinda, wife of Charles F. Edmund, lot No. 6: Beginning at a gate and stone in the line of No. 3 and corner to No. 5, near a slough, thence down the same with its meanders N. 41° W. 147 poles to the mouth of the pond slough, thence up another fork of said slough N. 35° E. 62 poles to 2 red oaks and elm to W. H. Pilford's corner, thence with the Eastern boundary line of the Duval survey S. 70° E. 58 poles to a white oak, Duval's corner, thence S. 42° W. 48 poles to three large hickories, corner to the Mitchell land, thence S. 56½° E. 44½ poles to a hickory and 1 oak, Mitchell's corner, thence S. 51° E. 38 poles to a stone and 2 large beeches marked as pointers, thence S. 51½° N. 54 poles to a stone, corner to lot No. 4, thence with a line of same S. 32° E. 25 poles to a stone, corner to lot No. 4, thence S. 52° W. 28½ poles to the beginning, containing 68 acres, 1 rood and 24 poles. To my daughter Mary W. wife of John Stewart, lot No. 7: Beginning at a beech, sugar tree and elm on the North side of the river, the corner of Samuel James' old survey, thence N. 49° W. 72½ poles to a hickory and elm on the pond slough, thence down same with its meanders to the mouth of same on a straight line, thence N. 41° W. 40 poles to the mouth of said slough, thence down the main slough with its meanders and W. H. Pilford's line to the cut off at the river, thence up the river with its meanders to the beginning, containing 28 acres. To my daughter Pardine, wife of Benjamin Turner, a certain tract or parcel of land, lying in the County of Butler and State of Kentucky, on the waters of Malehee creek and being a part of the W. R. Boyner land, known lot No. 33; the parcel I hereby bequeath is bounded as follows: Beginning on a chestnut, poplar, and small hickory at the head of a small drain, corner of lot No. 31 and also corner to lot 33, thence said drain with its meanders to a line of lot No. 30, thence Eastward with the line of lot No. 30 to the corner of lot No. 32 in the line of lot No. 30, thence with the line of No. 30 to the corner of lot No. 32, thence with the line of lot No. 32 to a hickory in the line of lot No. 31, thence with the line of lot No. 31 to the beginning, containing 30 acres more or less. To my daughter Angeline, wife of William Cardwell, a tract of land in Butler County, Kentucky, on the waters of Malehee, my old

farm containing 100 acres: for a further description of said land reference is hereby given to the deed from my father to me, recorded in Book page 99. To my son Bedford P. Fleener 2 tracts of land lying in Butler County, Ky. on the waters of Indian Camp creek, known as a part of the Woodfork survey, lying between the farms of Wm. Hoines Fleener and Bedford P. Fleener, and bounded on the Southeast by Isaac Mitchell: the other tract is situated on the ridge near where the widow died, on the West side of her survey; Beginning at the Widow Phelps' corner, 3 white oaks, thence with her line North in the original Woodfork line to a stake, thence East to George Petty's line 125 poles, thence Southward with Petty's line to his corner, thence on a straight line to Jack Fleener's corner, a double hickory, thence Westward with his line to the beginning. To my son James A. Fleener, Five Hundred Dollars, less the amount of 2 notes which I hold against him; and I direct that the interest shall not be counted on said notes from and after this date. I also direct that there shall be a permanent road from my present residence to the Duval stable as it now exists. In addition to the lands I have bequeathed in this will to my daughters, viz: Paradise Turner and Angeline Cardwell, I direct that my executors pay to each of my said daughters One Hundred Dollars out of the first money that may fall in their hands after my debts are paid. I do this to make them equal with my other children. I direct that all the property of which I may be possessed at my decease, both real and personal, be sold after my decease, and the proceeds be equally divided among my heirs, except that which has herein been devised by me. I request that my Executors use their best judgment in the disposal of the land, in such manner as they think best. I hereby make, constitute, and appoint my son John W., and James A. Woodge my grandson, and John G. Stewart, to be my Executors of this my last will and testament, - hereby revoking all former wills by me made. In witness whereof I have hereunto subscribed my name and affixed my seal, this 8th day of November, A. D. 1881.
