

In the name of God amen. I, John Pattie, of the County of Ohio and State of Kentucky, being in bad bodily health but of sound and disposing mind and memory, calling to mind the frailty and uncertainty of human life, and being desirous of settling my worldly affairs, and directing how the estate with which it has pleased God to bless me, shall be disposed of after my my decease, while I have capability or capacity and strength so to do, make and publish this my last will and testament; hereby revoking and making null and void all other last wills and testaments by me heretofore made: And first I commend my immortal spirit, to him who gave it, and my body to the earth, to be buried with little expense or ostentation by my executor hereinafter named.

I appoint my beloved wife Mary Pattie, my sole executrix during my said decease, to pay all my just debts, and funeral expenses, so far as convenient after my decease.

Secondly: I give unto my beloved wife Mary Pattie, all the property of every kind, both real and personal, that I shall die possessed of, during her natural life or widowhood and at her death, I direct that one hundred dollars shall be paid to each one of my children except William R. Pattie, after which the remainder of my estate shall be equally divided among all of my children.

Thirdly: I direct that within one or six months my servants are to be sold, except it be to one of my children.

In testimony whereof I have signed my hand and seal and published this to be my last will and testament, in the presence of the witnesses, named below, this the fifteenth day of March in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and fifty three.
