

and take care of her; in which event, or at the death of my wife, my daughter Lucy shall remove to the land devised to her under my will, and Stephen shall take charge of the homestead as therein directed. I further request that Stephen be not compelled to settle his accounts as my Executor till he shall be ready to make a final settlement. I leave it to Stephen's discretion in the event the immediate care of his mother shall devolve upon him, to take her to his house or himself remove to the homestead, in which latter event he is to pay no rent. The tract of land devised to Lucy Panner I place under Stephen's control so long as Lucy and her mother live together, and the profits are to be applied to paying the way of my wife and said daughter if necessary; but if not needed for that purpose, such profits shall go into and be distributed as my general personal estate. If Lucy wants to move to her farm during her mother's life, she is to have such live-stock as may be necessary to start to farming, without being charged therewith. This 30th September, 1880.

Fourth, It is my will and desire that after the youngest child shall become of age, that my estate both personal and real, or so much thereof as may remain, shall be equally divided among each of my children not heretofore named: Charles W. Howard, Sarah P. Howard, Emily J. Howard, Luther A. Howard, Mary Ann Howard, reserving the third part thereof for the benefit and support of my widow, through her natural life. Fifth, I hereby appoint my beloved wife Margaret A. Howard sole executrix of this my last will and testament, hereby revoking all other wills made by me. I, Harrison Fleener of the County of Ohio and State of Kentucky, being of sound mind and memory, and considering the uncertainty of this frail and transitory life, do therefore make, ordain, publish, and declare this to be my last will and testament, that is to say: First, after all my lawful debts are paid and discharged, the residue of my estate real and personal I give, bequeath, and dispose of as follows, to-wit: To my beloved wife all the household and kitchen furniture, two horses, two cows and calves, five head of sheep, one year's provision, also a lien on lot No. 1 and lot No. 2, for her maintenance during her natural life, which lots will be hereinafter described.
