

Beaver Dam Ohio Co. Ky.

Oct 9th 1901.

I, Sue E. Mitchell of the County of Ohio in the State of Kentucky, do make this my first Will and testament. I direct that my body be entombed in the Liberty Cemetery, by the side of my first husband (H. J. Hooper) according to the rites and ceremonies of the said Liberty Church, and that my funeral be conducted in a manner corresponding with my estate and situation in life, and as to such worldly estate as it hath pleased God to intrust me with, I dispose of the same as follows:

First: I direct that all my funeral expenses be paid as soon after my decease as convenient, and that one hundred dollars in money be set aside for a monument to be erected to my grave. Also I direct that my interest in my father's (J. A. Taylor) home farm to go to my brother M. F. Taylor and his heirs forever.

I also direct, that all my household goods, and clothing, and organ to go to my Niece Lizzie E. Taylor, and the balance of my estate to be equally divided between my husband H. J. Mitchell and my Niece Lizzie E. Taylor, and at the death of my said husband, the property bequeathed to him I give to my said Niece, and should my said Niece die without issue I direct that her part go to my brother M. F. Taylor's two youngest daughters, Nellie and Audie Taylor now living with their father. In Witness Whereof I, Sue E. Mitchell the testator have to this my will written on one sheet of paper, set my hand. This 9 day of Oct. 1901.
