Perry owes me, also the Walters Meiers note for about two hundred dollars, I impose two Cornland calves and hogs enough to do her family for one year, one half of the young Cattle, 3 plows and 1 mow and five beds and bedding, one half of the charr and what of the furniture that the law would give her. I wish my daughter Fidelity to be made equal with the rest of my children, that she will have my horse Bill one Cow and calf, one bed and bedding, also that she shall have all of her uncollected school money. Then all the balance of my property together with the old Mill property to be equally divided between my three share and share alike except James who has been provided for after my debts and funeral expenses are paid. I appoint John W. Taylor and my son James my Executors to carry out this will.
